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University community loses educator



Dr. William McGucken, professor of history, died Saturday, August 12, following a long illness. He joined the USI faculty in 1998. A native of Belfast, Northern Ireland, Dr. McGucken came to the United States as a Thouron Scholar at the University of Pennsylvania, where he earned a doctorate in the history and philosophy of science. His specialty was

researching historical interactions of science and technology with society and the environment.

Dr. McGucken was chair of the History Department from 1998 to 1999 when he became ill. He was a member of the History of Science Society, Society for the History of Techology, and the American Society for Environmental History, among others.

"When Bill McGucken came to USI after a distinguished career in Ohio, he brought a wisdom, humanity, and warmth that all of us prized almost immediately," said **Dr. Thomas Wilhelmus**, associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts. "The loss of this kind and perceptive man is a great blow to the School of Liberal Arts. Bill will be sorely missed, and our hearts go out to Emilia and to his family."

Dr. McGucken was creator and co-editor of five volumes of Series on Technology and the Environment, University of Akron Press. He refereed manuscripts for Isis, The British Journal for the History of Science, Historical Studies in the Physical Sciences, Ambix, Social Studies of Science, Environmental History Review, and Technology and Culture as well as for Princeton University Press, University of California Press, and University of Akron Press. Dr. McGucken also refereed applications to the National Science Foundation for grants for research in the history of science.

"He was a marvelous colleague," said **Dr. Nancy Rhoden**, acting chair of the History Department, "he will be missed very much in the History Department."

Dr. McGucken published three books: Nineteenth-Century Spectoscopy: Development of the Understanding of Spectra, 1802-1897, 1970; Scientist, Society and State: The Social Relations of Science Movement in Great Britain, 1931-1947, 1984; and Biodegradable: Detergents and the Environment, 1991. Articles by Dr. McGucken have appeared in numerous journals including Environmental History Review, Minerva, and Notes and Records of the Royal Society of London.

Dr. McGucken received a B.Sc. in both physics and mathematics and an M.A. in philosophy from The Queen's University in Belfast. Before coming to USI, he served on the faculty at Akron University for 30 years.

Dr. McGucken is survived by his wife **Dr. Emilia McGucken**, lecturer in sociology, and children Natalie and Elliot. Memorial contributions may be made to the USI Foundation in memory of William McGucken for a History Department award.
