



MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S STROLL - EVENINGS OF ART IN NEW HARMONY

Some of New Harmony's artistic treasures will be highlighted on the seventh annual Midsummer Night's Stroll: folk art paintings by Jacob Maentel in the Jaquess Parlor, contemporary works of art by two regional artists in the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, beautifully detailed nineteenth century lithographs of Native Americans in the Maximilian-Bodmer Collection, and religious sculptures in the Roofless Church.

The walking tour, which begins at The Atheneum/Visitors' Center at 6:30 p.m. on July 6, 13, 20, and 27, will be directed by a commemorative booklet and supplemented by tour guides leading tours of five buildings. The stroll concludes with a reception at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art.

Tickets are \$6 for adults and \$4 for children ages 7-17 and may be purchased at The Atheneum/Visitors' Center between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. Members of the New Harmony Society are admitted free. For more information call (812) 682-4488.

TWO PROFESSIONAL THEATRE PRODUCTIONS PLAYING IN NEW HARMONY THIS WEEK

Opening plays for Season 93 of The New Harmony Theatre continue this week with *Lettice and Lovage* playing at Murphy Auditorium through July 3 and *Hot 'N' Cole* playing at Thralls Opera House through July 17. ALERT ISSUED ON EXPLOSIVE DEVICES

FBI Director William S. Sessions made the following statement on June 24 regarding two incidents in which explosive devices were received by professors at two different universities.

On June 22, 1993, a University of California at San Francisco professor (UCSF) opened a package which had been mailed to his residence. The package exploded when opened, causing severe injuries.

On June 24, 1993, a Yale University professor was severely injured in an explosion while opening mail at his Yale office.

The FBI is working with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms, the U.S. Postal Inspectors, and local law enforcement agencies in the investigation of both incidents.

The FBI urges all University personnel to be alert to packages and mail received, both at their employment and at their residences. Barry Hart, USI director of Safety and Security, urges faculty and staff to be alert to packages that are marked personal or confidential with return addresses that are not familiar. He said to call his office, extension 7071, to report any concerns.

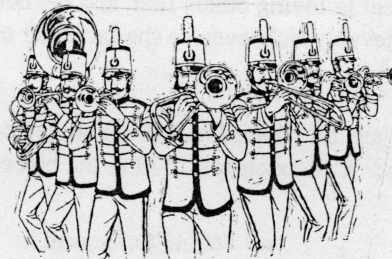

NAMES IN THE NEWS

Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs and Mr. Larry Bohleber, manager of Business Development Programs, participated in the third leadership workshop of the Academic Leadership Academy, June 4-6 in Washington, D.C. Funded by the Kellogg Foundation, the Academy is designed to foster the leadership potential of experienced administrators with particular attention to women and minorities. Dr. Reid has been a member of the National Advisory Committee from the beginning of the Academy; in addition, he serves as a mentor for several of the fellows. Mr. Bohleber guided this third group of participants through a session which assessed personal leadership styles. This year's fellows come from Georgia, North Carolina, and Virginia.

USI LICENSE PLATE

The minimum order of 200 USI license plates remains in effect if the University is to continue in the Indiana Department of Motor Vehicles' specialized plate program.

An official plate certificate will be mailed in December, to be presented to the license branch office to obtain plates, starting in January 1994. A \$10 per-plate processing fee will be charged at that time, in addition to regular plate fees.
