## HEALTH NOTES

from the Human Resources Department

**A BALANCED BACK IS A HEALTHY BACK** - For a healthy back, its three natural curves must be in alignment while sitting, standing, lying down, or moving. The key element in keeping a balanced back is strong, flexible supporting muscles and joints.

**The Three Natural Curves** - cervical (neck), thoracic (middle back), and lumbar (lower back) - When all are balanced, the ear, shoulder, and hip line up straight. "Good posture" means keeping back curves in balance.

Healthy movement, with the three natural curves aligned, keeps the lumbar curve in a neutral or "safe" position. Overflexion, or bending forward too much, increases pressure on discs. Overextension, or arching backward, overloads facets, forcing

them to take the weight of the load.

**Muscles** - A healthy spine is supported by strong and flexible back, abdominal, hip, and leg muscles. Muscles that lack strength and flexibility cannot maintain the back's natural curves, which can lead to back problems and possibly injury.

**Joints** - Strong and flexible hip, knee, ankle, and back joints help balance back curves and allow movement. Joints that lack strength and flexibility fail to support the spine, which also can contribute to back problems.

**Back in Motion** - Learning how to keep the back balanced when in motion (good posture, body mechanics, and lifting techniques) can help to maintain a healthy back and prevent injury.
