Volunteer luncheon

The first annual Volunteer USI Recognition Luncheon will be held at noon Friday, July 25, in Carter Hall, with honors to be bestowed on the Volunteer of the Year, the Volunteer Task Force which spent two years organizing the USI program, and nearly 350 volunteers who have given 20 hours or more to the University in this first year of formal volunteer operations. (The luncheon is by invitation only.)

Volunteer USI records show 833 people have contributed their time to University events this past year — 556 from the community, 153 alumni, 64 USI employees, and 25 students. Included are 341 who donated 20-plus hours, 134 with 100 to 249 hours, 30 with 250 to 499 hours, nine with 500 to 749 hours, six with more than 750 hours, and four occupational therapy professionals who have given more than 1,000 each to assist USI occupational therapy students. Calculated at the minimum wage rate, the volunteers contributed \$262,575 to the University since the program got under way July 1, 1996.

Ms. Joanne Wright recently was re-elected president of the Volunteer USI Advisory Board for 1997-98. Mr. Troy Land is vice president, Mrs. Joanie Jost, secretary, and Mrs. Janet Duncan, treasurer. Mrs. Nancy Johnson is director of USI Alumni and Volunteer Services, which oversees program operations.
