FALL SEMESTER STARTS AUGUST 31. Preparations are well under way for the start of classes on Monday, August 31. Family Orientation will be held Sunday, August 23, starting with the Sunday buffet in the USI Dining Center. A welcoming program will be held at 1 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center, followed by meetings with division chairmen, campus tours, and a reception at the University Home. New-student orientation will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, August 24-25; orientation for nontraditional (age 25 and over) students will be available at 10:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday in Forum III. Placement testing will be held from 1 to 5 p.m. Tuesday in Forum I and II. New-student registration will be Wednesday, August 26, and open registration, Thursday, August 27; late registration starts Monday, August 31. The USI AMIGOS will sponsor an all-campus dance from 9 p.m. to 12 midnight Friday, August 28, on the UC Mall; if it rains, the dance will be moved to the UC Dining Center.

The University Meeting for faculty and administrative staff will be held Monday, August 24, in Forum II. There will be coffee and donuts at 8:30 a.m., with the meeting to start at 9 a.m. The speaker will be Dr. Trudy Banta, research professor at the Learning Research Center, University of Tennessee, Knoxville. Lunch will follow in the University Dining Center.

Full service will be resumed in the USI Dining Room on Monday, August 31. Serving will be from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Regular hours of 7:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. will be resumed in the Snack Bar that day.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Mr. Eric Sprouls, USI associate professor of mining engineering technology, is a member of the Indiana Coal Mining and Reclamation Task Force, which was established in 1986 to aid the effort to obtain funds for research in mining and reclamation. USI TO OFFER CLASSES IN JASPER. The USI Office of Continuing Education has joined with Southern Hills Counseling Center in Jasper to offer a series of noncredit workshops on human resource development which officials in and around Dubois County have determined would be of benefit in their area. The program was announced Wednes-

day (today) in Jasper by Dr. M. Edward Jones, USI director of Continuing Education and General Studies, and Mr. Donald Aronoff, executive director of the Southern Hills Center. The first program, "Management Skills for Secretaries, Administrative Assistants, and Office Supervisors," will be presented Tuesday, September 22.

PRIMITIVE-STYLE ARTISTS IN NEW HARMONY. The works of Ms. Cecile Anne Broz and Mr. Nicholas Kripal, who use primitive styles to present modern works of art, are being featured at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art through August 31. Ms. Broz is a New Harmony native now living in Lamoni, Iowa. She works in a variety of print forms including wood cuts, one of the most primitive. She received a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Nebraska and is an art instructor at Graceland College in Lamoni. Mr. Kripal's works, influenced by Southwest Indian art, include large-scale humanlike busts and figures from stabilized, colored adobe. He received a Master of Fine Arts degree in ceramic from Southern Illinois University at Edwards-ville and is an assistant professor at Tyler School of Art, Temple University, Philadelphia.

"GIN GAME" CLOSING AT NEW HARMONY. The New Harmony Theatre will present the final performances of "Gin Game" on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, August 13-14-15, at Thrall's Opera House. The next production, "Greater Tuna" — a comedy in which two actors portray 20 residents of a small town in Texas — will open Thursday, August 20, and run through September 26, also at Thrall's. The curtain goes up at 8 p.m. Thursday—Saturday and 2 p.m. on Sundays.
