# University Notes

EVANSVILLE CAMPUS

ISUE ENROLLMENT UP. Official enrollment figures for fall 1980 show that a total of 3,251 students have registered for credit classes at ISUE. This compares to the fall 1979 enrollment figure of 3,018 students and reflects a 7.7% increase over last year. In 1979, ISUE's enrollment topped 3,000 students for the first time.

ISUE President David L. Rice said several factors probably account for the increase,

but pointed to two key factors: (1) the growing awareness in southwestern Indiana of the strength of ISUE's academic programs and instructional faculty and (2) the effect of harsh economic conditions. "Unfortunately, part of this enrollment increase reflects the current economic downturn and students, in their wisdom, take advantage of such economic turns to begin or continue their education so that they may increase the range of their professional and occupational competencies," he stated.

OPEN HOUSE FESTIVITIES SET FOR HPER BUILDING AND CAMPUS. ISUE will celebrate the official opening of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building during the weekend of October 3 - 5.

On Friday morning, October 3, the ISUE Foundation has invited persons who donated to the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building Fund Drive to an appreciation breakfast in the building. Following the breakfast, the entire University community is invited to participate in the ribbon cutting ceremony. The ribbon cutting ceremony will take place at approximately 9:15 at the building and persons wishing to attend are encouraged to bring their own scissors and assist in the festivities. Classes will not be postponed or cancelled, but according to Dr. Robert Reid, vice president for academic affairs, faculty are encouraged to allow students who wish to attend the ceremony to make up any missed work. Tours of the building will be given following the ceremony.

On Friday afternoon from 2:00 - 4:00, an ice cream social at poolside in the HPER Building is being sponsored for clerical and support employees of the University. Department heads will dish up ice cream for the employees and all University employees are invited to drop in during the two-hour period.

The "HPER All-Niter" will begin Friday evening at 7:00 and continue until 3:00 a.m. Saturday. Sponsored by the Student Union Board, the evening event in the building will feature a reception for the University community at 7:00 p.m., followed by open recreation, demonstrations in all types of health maintenance and recreation activities possible in the building, a dance, tournaments, movies, and entertainment. At 9:00 p.m., Ken Weber, hypnotist and mentalist, will perform. According to SUB organizers, the "HPER All-Niter" is sponsored to familiarize students with the building capabilities and to give them an opportunity to participate in every activity possible in the building. Though it is sponsored primarily for students, all members of the University family are welcome to attend.

Activities on Saturday, October 4, include the ISUE vs. Marquette soccer match at 2:00 p.m. and the Secretaries of ISUE apple-butter preparations at Eicher Barn.

OPEN HOUSE (continued). On Sunday, October 5, the traditional campus Open House activities will be held from 12 noon to 3:00 p.m. Though the focus will be on the HPER Building, many other activities are planned throughout the campus. The Sunday Buffet will be served from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the University Center Dining Room. Two mini-concerts by the Mid-America Singers, under the direction of Will Kesling, will be given at 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. in Room 126 of the Administration Building. Special displays, including microform machines, will be set up in the University Library featuring old newspaper coverage of such events as Lincoln and Kennedy assassinations, the sinking of the Titanic, and so forth. Informal tours will be conducted, and a set of fine art slides will be on display in the front entry area. Media Services will be open for tours in Room 221 of the Technology Building. Computer games will be demonstrated on terminals in Room 119 of the Technology Building. A blood pressure clinic will be held in Room 30 of the Administration Building, and the Secretary's Club will sell apple butter at the Eicher Barn.

In the HPER Building, demonstrations and exhibitions of equipment and activities are planned throughout the building. The ISUE Alumni Association will sponsor a reception at poolside and tours of the building will be given during the afternoon.

Campus tours will be available aboard the Royal Foods double-decker bus. All members of the University community are encouraged to participate and attend Open House activities and to help welcome our visitors to campus.

THE LATEST IN ISUE SPORTS. The ISUE Cross Country team now has a record of 18 wins and 1 loss. They won all four first places in the meet with Bellarmine and Wright State over the weekend.

The ISUE Soccer team is now 3 - 2. They lost a game Friday in the Eastern Illinois Invitational to North Texas (3-1), but returned to win on Saturday by a score of 3-1 over Lewis University.

The ISUE Women's Volleyball team defeated the ISU-Jr. Varsity during the weekend. They also defeated Wabash Valley.

The Women's Tennis team beat Vincennes by a score of 9-0 over the weekend.

The Baseball team is now 2 - 0 after winning both games in a doubleheader over Wabash with scores of 16-5 and 6-4.
