

USI sets record enrollment; student profile is becoming more traditional

USI enrollment figures for fall semester 1999 show a record enrollment of 8,695 students, up three percent over last year's record enrollment.

Growth is coming from traditional age (18-24 years of age) students. This fall 6,652 students are in the traditional age category, with 2,043 students over 24 years of age. Last year 6,211 students were traditional age.

Full-time students outnumber part-time students, with 6,307 full-time students on campus and 2,388 part-time students. Last year 5,903 students were full-time. Women students are in the majority, with 5,174 women registered and 3,521 men. Minority and international students represent nearly five percent of the student population. Black students, the largest minority population on campus, represent three percent of the students.

Students continue to come from Vanderburgh, Posey, Warrick, and Gibson counties with 4,883 students from those southern Indiana counties. Most of the remaining students (2,995) come from other counties in Indiana. This year each of Indiana's 92 counties are represented in the student population. Seven hundred seventy-eight students are from other states and 39 from other countries.

The USI student profile is changing from commuter to residential with more than 2,500 students living on campus. The first residence hall, Fred C. Newman Hall, opened this fall with 220 students. A second residence hall will open next fall. To accommodate the needs of this changing student body, USI is partnering with Deaconess Hospital to offer a USI Student Health Center on the lower level of the Health Professions Center and Sodexo Marriott to offer a meal plan for resident students.

Edward Jones, associate vice president of Academic Affairs and director of Extended Services; Mr. Barry K. Schonberger, dean of students; Ms. Pauline M. Schuler, library clerk; and Mr. Steven E. Selby, motor vehicles operations supervisor.

Activities during and surrounding Indiana Archaeology Week feature educational opportunities

Exhibits featuring recent archaeological discoveries in Posey County continue through Thursday, September 30, at Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon, Carnegie Library in Poseyville, Hovey Lake Fish and Wildlife Area Interpreter's Center, and Workingmen's Institute in New Harmony. The exhibits will showcase excavations conducted since 1996 at the Hovey Lake village site, a late Mississippian Caborn-Welborn Indian site dating from A.D. 1400-1700. Archaeological investigations were conducted by Cheryl Ann Munson, research archaeologist at Indiana University, assisted by **Marjorie Jones**, USI instructor in anthropology, along with USI archaeology students.

Artifact Identification Day will be held from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday, September 12, at Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon. Interested persons are encouraged to bring prehistoric and early historic artifacts to be identified by Cheryl Ann Munson and Patrick Munson, anthropologist at IU.

Posey County fourth graders will visit the Hovey Lake archaeological site Monday through Friday, September 13 - 17, and Monday through Thursday, September 20 - 23. Students will have the opportunity to see archaeological research in progress and ask questions of archaeologists, mostly comprised of USI students, while they work. Fourth graders also will participate in hands-on activities cataloguing excavated artifacts and samples and interpreting maps and records from archaeological research.

Rex Garniewicz, animal bone identification expert and a graduate student at IU, will give an illustrated public lecture, "The Archaeology of Hunting in Southern Indiana, Prehistoric Patterns and Prey," at 7 p.m., Tuesday, September 14, at Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon. The lecture will focus on recent research to decipher the hunting and fishing methods of prehistoric Native Americans prior to the introduction of firearms.

Excavation tours will be held 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday - Sunday, September 25 - 26, at the Hovey Lake site. Munson and Jones will join USI and University of Evansville students as they explain methods used in test excavations and interpret deposits and materials exposed. Jones will be at work in a field laboratory with USI students and available to discuss the fate of artifacts after excavation. Jim Burton, naturalist at Angel Mounds, will demonstrate Native American pit-cooking and stone tool knapping. Visitors will be encouraged to participate.

Directions: Drive west of Mt. Vernon on SR 62, turn south on SR 69 to Hovey Lake. Park at the visitor's center. A van will shuttle visitors to the excavation area. Walking to the site is not advised. The excavation site is not handicap accessible.

Ms. Linda L. Cleek, a 1982 USI graduate, accepted the position of secretary in Continuing Education and General Studies in 1974. She was promoted to assistant director of Continuing Education in 1985 and assumed her current position in 1995.

Active in professional organizations, Ms. Cleek serves as chair of the University Continuing Education Association (UCEA) Region Four Committee on Committees, was previously chair of the UCEA Conferences and Professional Programming Community of Practice, and served on the board of directors of Leadership Evansville and the Retired and Senior Volunteers Program.

She is on the board of directors of Westside Improvement Association, where she serves as USI representative. Ms. Cleek is an original organizer for the RopeWalk Writers Retreat, a writers conference held annually in New Harmony, and continues to manage logistics for the event. Ms. Cleek is a past board member for the Arts Council of Southwest Indiana.

Ms. Cleek said her best day at USI was April 16, 1985, the day USI became a separate state university. She said, "We all knew things would change, we just didn't know how much. One thing I miss about those early days is knowing every employee, most of the student workers, and many of the students."

"USI has provided a variety of experiences for me," she added. "I tell people my job is whatever isn't specifically somebody else's job. I've even done animal wrangling on campus. I captured a garter snake in the UC and took it to the woods, chased cows from Westwood Lodge, caught a wild cat in a UC storage room, and chased a pig at the Children's Center. I obviously like it because when I came here I had no intention of staying this long."



Dr. M. Edward Jones earned a B.S. from Brescia College, and an M.S. and Ed.D. from Indiana University. Before coming to USI, he was an associate instructor at Indiana University and later served as assistant dean of the Evening Divisions at Northwestern University. In 1974, he came to USI as the first director of Continuing Education and General Studies.

Dr. Jones said, "When we started noncredit continuing education programming in spring 1975, we scheduled six courses that enrolled 201 students." Now that office offers about 450 sections of noncredit courses each year that enroll about 8,500 students. The office coordinates most nontraditional delivery of credit courses. Off-campus credit course offerings have grown from four courses offered at Castle High School in Newburgh to holding off-campus courses at multiple sites, customized contract courses for employers, College Achievement Program courses, and distance education courses.

"I believe the increase - both in numbers of courses offered and in numbers enrolled - results from community interest in the educational outreach services we offer as well as the

need of many adults for education and training opportunities that typically are not available in the traditional on-campus credit format," he said.

Dr. Jones has held numerous leadership roles in professional continuing education associations and currently serves as treasurer of the Executive Committee of the University Continuing Education Association (UCEA). He previously was regional representative to the UCEA Board and served as chair of the Midwest Region (IV), and chair of the Division of Business, Industry, and Labor. He served two terms as chair of the Indiana Council on Continuing Education. He is the USI representative to the Indiana Partnership for Statewide Education.

Dr. Jones is active in regional workforce and economic development organizations. He is a member of the Workforce Investment Board of Southwest Indiana, the Alliance for Workforce Development, INOV8, the Tri-State World Trade Council, and the Citizens Advisory Committee for the Evansville Urban Transportation Study. He is a member of the Rotary Club of Evansville.

He said, "Friends often tease me about a truism I frequently use when faced with opportunities or challenges, that 'things have a way of working out'. But making the decision to come to USI 25 years ago is a great example of that. I do not know of another institution where I could have enjoyed the tremendous opportunities for both personal and professional growth that I've found here. It's extremely gratifying to look at how this institution has changed and realize that I've been a part of that positive growth. I am very proud of the growth of Extended Services from a two-person office to the comprehensive outreach and public service operation it is today. I have truly enjoyed being part of the USI community and the friendships that have made the past 25 years such a meaningful experience."



A native of St. Paul, Minnesota, **Mr. Barry Schonberger** earned a B.A. from Bemidji State University in Minnesota and an M.A. from Indiana State University. He came to work at USI as director of Student Activities immediately following undergraduate school. He said, "Coming from Minnesota, I thought southern Indiana was the deep south. It was the farthest south I had ever been."



As advisor to student organizations from 1974 to 1989, Mr. Schonberger has seen an increase in student clubs and organizations rise from 10 to over 90. As director of Student Activities and coordinator of the University Center from 1979 to 1989, he developed Student Leadership Development and planned and organized the University Student Life program all while managing the University Center.

As dean of students, Mr. Schonberger supervises Campus Ministries, Student Wellness Office, Multicultural Center, Student Health Center, and Intramurals. Mr. Schonberger said, "Many people change jobs looking for new opportunities and challenges; USI has always provided those things for me."

Besides responsibilities at the University, Mr. Schonberger is chair of Cub Scout Pack 371 and is on the board of directors

for the American Red Cross Evansville Chapter and for Junior Achievement. In August, he received the National Bronze Leadership Award from Junior Achievement for exemplary leadership. He is an active member of the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) and served as Southern Indiana Regional Executive. He won the SCCA Solo II national championship title in 1985, 1993, and 1996.

"On this campus, we've had the opportunity to create new programs and traditions from scratch rather than maintain what was already in place, and we have done that in a manner that reflected the unique culture of this campus," he said.

Ms. Pauline Schuler began employment with USI as a secretary in Rice Library's Circulation Department. In 1975, she transferred to the Technical Services Department where she stayed for 24 years, retiring this year. Ms. Schuler said, "I actually applied for a job in another department, but was offered the position in the library and I'm very glad it worked out that way."



She said she began taking night classes for self-improvement. Ms. Schuler recalled receiving a "B" in Dr. Thomas River's Introduction to Literature and that was a turning point in her life. She enrolled in other classes, but decided she did not want a degree.

She began attending public lectures on campus, however. The international speakers broadened her awareness of international political and social issues. She said working and spending evenings on campus was a growing experience for her.

Ms. Schuler spent part of many lunch hours walking on campus admiring the landscaping which she considers a great asset of the University. "In the early days, everyone was very friendly. I belonged to the USI Secretaries Club and I recall all of us making apple butter and selling it on campus as a fund raiser. I made many friends here."



Steven E. Selby accepted the position of grounds keeper in the winter of 1974. When he was promoted to supervisor of grounds by the following summer, he said he thought he was on the fast track for advancement. "I guess I goofed up because it was 20 years before my next promotion," he laughed. Mr. Selby was promoted to his present position in 1994.



Mr. Selby has seen many changes over the years. The University maintained six vehicles in 1974. The number of vehicles has grown to 65 not counting the delivery carts on campus. When appointed grounds supervisor 25 years ago, he recalled the Maintenance Barn really was a barn, and the newest building on campus was the University Center. The biggest change in University policy has been the ban on smoking.

Like many University employees, Mr. Selby considers the students to be the most rewarding aspect of employment here.

He has worked with hundreds of student workers and proudly reports on his continued friendships with many of them. "Of the many student workers in grounds maintenance and motor vehicle operations, some became law enforcement officers, teachers, doctors, and lawyers. One became a mayoral assistant and another a CIA agent."

Founders Day is observed each year to honor employees who have accumulated 25 years of service to the University. It is held on September 15, the date in 1965 when the University offered its first classes at the Centennial Campus.

Teaching Enhancement Awards Program deadline in October

The Center for Teaching and Learning Excellence (CTLE) has revised the guidelines for the Teaching Enhancement Awards (TEA) and has moved the review cycle to the fall semester of each academic year. The deadline for applications for year 2000 activities is Oct. 15, 1999.

The TEA program makes grants to individuals or groups of faculty members. These grants are limited to \$2,000 for individuals and \$4,000 for groups. The grants are specifically designed to provide faculty with development monies to support innovative teaching.

Electronic databases in Rice Library

Rice Library has added three full-text electronic databases, all of which are available campus-wide by selecting "Databases" under the "Online Catalog & Databases" section of the library's online site: <http://www.usi.edu/library/library.htm>.

General Science Abstracts Full Text

General Science Abstracts Full Text indexes and abstracts articles from more than 140 English-language periodicals and provides the full text of over 35 of those. Coverage includes popular science magazines, professional journals and the New York Times Science Section (published weekly on Tuesday). Abstracting coverage of periodicals begins with the March 1993 issues. Abstracts range from 50 - 300 words and describe the content and scope of the source articles. Full text coverage begins with January 1995.

ProQuest Health and Medical Complete

ProQuest Health and Medical Complete uses the same interface as Social Science Plus and ABI/Inform Global. It is a powerful combination of full-text materials from over 400 professional medical, nursing, and allied health journals, some with MEDLINE indexing, and consumer-oriented health journals on general health, mental health, nutrition, fitness and alternative/holistic health concerns. Some are earlier but most full-text articles are from 1997 and later.

JSTOR

JSTOR ("Journal Storage") is an electronic database of academic journal back issues (not current issues). Currently 117 full-text titles are included from 15 disciplines: African-American Studies, Anthropology, Asian Studies, Ecology, Economics, Education, Finance, History, Literature, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Science, Population, Sociology, and Statistics. Others will be added in time. This database is unusual in that while recent issues are not included, it provides full coverage of journals from volume 1, issue 1 to within the most recent three to five years.
