



HPER BUILDING TO OPEN JUNE 16, 1980.

The new Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building will be open for recreational activities on a limited basis on Monday, June 16, 1980. Although the building will be used for classes, athletic camps and continuing education starting Monday, June 9, additional time is needed for organization before general use of the building begins.

During this week students and employees may pay for lockers and towel service.

Payment will be made at the Cashier's window in the Administration Building and the receipt presented to the personnel at the equipment desk. A lock, towel and a locker assignment will then be issued.

The following temporary locker and towel service fees will be charged:

ISUE Student:	Service Charge	\$3.00 per semester or summer

This fee will allow the use of a small storage locker, a lock and a towel that can be exchanged for a clean towel after each use for all or any part of the summer or for either academic semester. No personal locks will be allowed on the storage lockers. A refund of \$1.50 will be made upon return of the towel and \$2.50 for the return of the lock.

Faculty and staff may also have lockers as assigned and have towel service. Larger lockers are available and are located in the faculty and staff locker rooms. Also available at a cost less than the faculty and staff locker are the same storage lockers available to students. The service charges for these two services are as follows:

CIVIL WAR BATTLE REENACTMENT ON ISUE CAMPUS. On July 4, 5, and 6, "Canons and Muskets on the Ohio," an authentic Civil War encampment-reenactment, will be held on the ISUE campus as part of the 1980 Freedom Festival.

The Battle of Richmond in which the Confederate Army of Tennessee invaded Kentucky will be reenacted over the three day weekend which also includes military drills, a ladies' ball dress competition and a military ball.

Major Joseph A. Malcolm, professor of military science at the University of Tennessee, will narrate the battle and skirmishes. Authentic Civil War music will be presented by "The Troupe," a five piece brass band consisting of professional musicians from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

ISU FEDERAL CREDIT UNION. Due to the easing of the Federal Credit Restraint Policy, the ISUFCU Board held a special meeting on May 27, 1980 and voted to reduce the new vehicle loan rate back to 12%. Currently all 1979 and 1980 model vehicles which are pledged as security are eligible for the 12% rate. The secured and open-end loan restrictions have been lifted.

OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR BLUE CROSS BLUE SHIELD. The Blue Cross Blue Shield group insurance program at ISUE provides that during the month of the policy anniversary date open enrollment is available to all eligible employees who have not previously enrolled.

Present members who are married and are carrying the single Blue Cross Blue Shield coverage, and now would like to include spouse and/or children in their coverage, may do so during June to be effective July 10, 1980.

The cost is \$8.38 per month for single coverage; \$21.50 per month for family coverage.
