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WSWI'S RADIO THEATRE TO REMEMBER WW II

WSWI's *Radio Theatre* will offer a 70-minute special on December 7, "The Sounds of World War II," as a 50th anniversary commemorative created by Dr. Gordon E. Kelley, associate dean of the School of Nursing and Health Professions and host of the weekly program.

Radio Theatre will begin at 10 a.m. with a wartime Bob Hope show from Denver, and close with a Fred Waring show broadcast December 8, 1941. Sandwiched in between will be an audio compilation of major historic events, excerpts of actual voices and sounds of the war, based on available recordings. Political figures of the era will be heard: President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, and Adolph Hitler.

The program covers the period from late 1938 until the Japanese surrender was signed in Tokyo Bay in 1945. With radio news in its infancy, few recordings exist, but those Dr. Kelley has found include "on the spot" reports and, interestingly, one from on board an LST during the Normandy invasion. Dr. Kelley said no one knows if the ship was one of those built in Evansville.

USI EUROPEAN TOUR. "Cathedrals of Europe - A Travel/Study Adventure" is a one-semester program offered by the Office of Continuing Education as a noncredit or graduate course that, for those who want to make the trip, will culminate in a 15-day tour of the famous edifices of Europe -- great cathedrals that are among the world's most recognizable landmarks as well as a

testimonial to human abilities and possibilities.

The program will begin January 14 with ten weekly "Cathedrals" classes, eight of them featuring guest speakers with expertise in spirituality, architecture, construction, art, music, stained glass, cultures, and literature. The respective speakers will include the Rev. David Nunning, pastor of St. Wendell Catholic Church; Mr. David Will, architect; Mr. Augustine J. Fredrich, chair, Engineering Technology Department; Mr. Michael K. Aakhus, associate professor of art; Ms. Jean Noyes, WNN-FM 88 program manager; Mr. John W. McNaughton, professor of art; and Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history. (A speaker on literature will be announced later.)

The European tour group -- up to 40 people accompanied by Mr. Fredrich and Mrs. Linda L. Cleek, assistant director for Continuing Education -- will leave Evansville June 15, arriving in Milan the next morning. They will visit Florence, Siena, Rome, Assisi, Venice, Innsbruck (via Brenner Pass), Salzburg, Munich, Ulm, Paris, Mt. St. Michel, Rouen, Leuven, Cologne, Aachen, and Brussels, where they will depart for Evansville. A five-day extension to visit London also is available.

Among the cathedrals on the tour will be Santa Maria Delli Fiore in Florence; St. Peter's Basilica, St. Paul, St. John Lateran, and St. Maria Maggiore in Rome, plus the Colosseum; Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi; Hofkirche in Innsbruck; Reims Cathedral; and Notre Dame, the Basilica of Sacre Coeur, and Cathedral of Chartres in Paris. The London extension will include Westminster Abbey.

The cost of the European tour will be \$2,825 per person; the London extension is \$495 (all double occupancy). The air portion of the prices is guaranteed through December 13, which is the initial deadline to sign up for the tour. Registrations will be accepted on a space-available basis through April 16, however. The registration fee for the spring semester cathedrals course is \$50 for non-
