ISUE PROCLAIMS NOVEMBER 12 THROUGH 16
AS "RIDE THE BUS WEEK." President Rice
has proclaimed the week of November 12
through 16 as "Ride the Bus Week" at ISUE,
encouraging all students, faculty, and
staff to ride the METS bus from home to
downtown and catch the ISUE bus to campus.

Rice says he hopes this "week" will help
draw attention to an alternative method
of transportation in our community and

to relieve the financial burden that the ever-increasing cost of gasoline is placing
on all people.

The ISUE bus has been provided to ISUE in cooperation with the Evansville Transit
Board and has been in operation since the beginning of the fall semester.

"The continued support by the Transit Board will be contingent on the number of riders
that use the service on a regular basis," says Rice. He hopes "Ride the Bus Week"
will acquaint more people with the bus service and that a number of those people will
make the ISUE bus and METS their regular mode of transportation to and from the campus.

Saga Foods is cooperating with the promotion by providing a free drink to each rider
during the week. A coupon, which can be exchanged in the ISUE Snack Bar for a soft
drink or cup of coffee, will be given to each passenger.

HUMANITIES FORUM. The Humanities Forum series will present two varied events during the upcoming week. First, on Tuesday, November 13, SHERRY DARRELL, associate professor of English, will examine the roles of women in Greek literature in her lecture "The Fox That Launched a Thousand Ships and Others of Her Kind." She will deal with such women and works as Agamemnon's Clytemnestra, Alcestis, Helen, and others.

"I want to show how these women are similar to, yet different from, contemporary women," said DARRELL, "especially in their passions, their freedoms, and their responsibilities in Greek society."

The lecture is scheduled from 12:00 to 1:30 p.m. in UC350.

The second event in the Humanities Forum series, scheduled for Thursday, November 15, is a vocal recital by Roy Samuelson, an opera singer, who is professor of music with the Indiana University Opera Theatre.

Samuelson, who was born and raised in Norway, has performed extensively with orchestras such as the Chicago Symphony, the Minnesota Orchestra, and the St. Louis Symphony, and his range of operatic experiences spans the German (Hans Sachs, Wotan), Italian (Rigoletto, Macbeth), and the French (Mephistopheles) repertoire.

His performance program will include both classical and contemporary selections. The recital is scheduled from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. in Room 28 of the Administration Building.

All Humanities Forum events are free to the public.

FALL FILM SERIES. "Blow Up," a film exemplifying the new Italian cinema, will be shown at 2:00 and 6:00 p.m. in A126. Admission is free.

WALK-JOG-RUN FOR HEART. The third annual "Walk-Jog-Run for Heart" will begin at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, November 10 on the campus of ISUE. Registration for the event, sponsored by the American Heart Association and the University of Evansville Track Team, will be from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. at the ISUE campus. 
