New Harmony Gallery

The work of Mr. John Nelson of John Wood Community College, Quincy, Illinois, and Ms. Dornith Doherty, associate professor of photography at the University of North Texas, will be featured May 24 through June 26 at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. Both will attend an opening reception from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday, May 24, at the Gallery.

Mr. Nelson combines heavily textured surfaces and symbolic imagery to create large monochromatic paintings. Ms. Doherty infuses figurative and wildlife photographs to create mysterious, dream-like images. He received an M.F.A. from Northern Illinois University in 1982 and has since exhibited throughout the U.S. His work was featured in 1995 in the New York City Soho Biennial and the Texas National at Stephen Austin State University, Nacogdoches. Ms. Dornith received an M.F.A. from Yale in 1988 and has exhibited throughout the U.S., participating in exhibitions at the A.R.C. Gallery, Chicago; Houston Center for Photography; and Indiana State Museum. She received a Fulbright lecture/research grant in 1995 and an IAC Fellowship in 1993.

O'Daniel Leadership Academy:

Summer and fall classes planned by the new O'Daniel Leadership Academy will include:

"New Harmony Nights"

Two veteran New York actors, Ms. Christianne Tisdale and Mr. Alan Souza, will perform music from The New Harmony Theatre's (NHT) summer season in a special preview cabaret, "New Harmony Nights," at 8 p.m. Saturday, June 7, in Carter Hall. Popular tunes from the '30s, '40s, and '50s that conjure night and pre-dawn images, like "Moon Glow" and "Moonlight Serenade" will be some of the featured melodies. The actors will be joined by other cast members from the opening NHT musical, She Loves Me. Tickets will be sold as tables of eight for \$200 or individual seats for \$25. Light food and a cash bar will be available. Seating is limited; reservations can be made by calling the New Harmony Theatre, extension 1668 or 682-3115.

Blazing Trails - for any student who would like to explore and develop leadership skills, the 2 1/2-hour class will be divided between group discussion and experiential activities. Students will read Mr. Stephen Covey's "7 Habits of Highly Effective people" (book provided), spend time on reflective writing in their leadership log (provided), and work on a leadership project as a group; class time is set aside for the project. Blazing Trails Session I started May 13 and runs through June 13. Session II will run from July 21 through August 22, meeting daily for the first 10 days; students and the facilitator will determine additional meeting times while the group is working on their project for the rest of the session. Fall Blazing Trails will meet from 7 to 9:30 p.m. Mondays and 9 to 11:30 a.m. Fridays.

Pathfinders - learn to be a student leadership consultant; Pathfinders will be able to help student leaders plan retreats, set agendas, set organizational (and personal) goals, plan programs, and do team building with group members; assist in coordinating fall and spring leadership workshop series and conferences; after initial training semester, bi-weekly classes will meet from 3 to 5:30 p.m. Fridays, and have a two-day fall retreat. O'Daniel Leadership Academy will provide materials and resources.

Process Education Workshop

USI and Ivy Tech State College will sponsor a workshop June 16-18 at USI on process education, an educational philosophy which focuses on empowerment and development of "self-growers" who are lifelong learners with the ability to assess and improve their own performance.

Dr. Daniel Apple, president of Pacific Crest Software, will head the team leading the workshop. He has a B.A. in information science, mathematics, and chemistry from the University of California at Santa Cruz, an M.S. in industrial engineering and operations research from Syracuse University, and a Ph.D. in public policy and systems analysis from the State University of New York at Syracuse.

The three-day workshop will provide an experiential setting to learn the concepts and techniques associated with process education, centering on these topics: classroom facilitation, assessment activities, process education, and curriculum design. Workshop material provided for participants will include software, "Foundations of Learning," "Learning Assessment Journal," "The Primer for Process Education," teaching resource books, "A Handbook on Cooperative Education," and assessment instruments.

Postdoctoral fellowships:

The Columbia Society of Fellows in the Humanities will appoint several postdoctoral fellows in 1998-99, working with grants from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, William R. Kenan Trust, and the Arthur Vining Davis Foundation. Fellows must have received a Ph.D. between January 1, 1992, and July 1, 1998. The stipend will be \$30,000, half for independent research, half for teaching in the undergraduate program in general education; an additional \$1,000 is available to support research.

1998-99 Fulbright scholar awards: August 1 is the deadline to apply for 1998-99 Fulbright senior scholar awards. Opportunities for lecturing or advanced research in nearly 130 countries are available to faculty and to professionals outside of academe. Awards range from two months to a full academic year, and many assignments are flexible to the needs of the grantee. Virtually all disciplines participate. Basic requirements are U.S. citizenship and the Ph.D. or comparable professional qualifications (such as a terminal degree in fine arts). Foreign language skills are needed for
