



JOIN BLUE CREW JOURNEY TO NCAA TOURNAMENT. The ISUE Screaming Eagles have accepted a bid to the NCAA Division II Great Lakes Region playoffs at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston, Sunday, March 5 and Monday, March 6.

COACH WAYNE BOULTINGHOUSE said, "I'm elated for the kids, the campus and the students. This has to be the biggest moment in sports for the school."

It was initially reported that reserved seats would be available for the game. However, word was received Wednesday, March 1 that all seats will be general admission at \$3.00 per person per night. Students showing a student i.d. card may purchase tickets for \$2.00 per person per night. Persons wishing to purchase their tickets in Evansville prior to the tournament may do so at the Arena beginning Thursday. Checks should be made payable to Eastern Illinois University.

The Student Union Board has arranged round trip bus transportation to the tourney for Sunday, March 5 and Monday, March 6. The bus will leave the ISUE Arena at 2:00 p.m. each day. Prices are \$12.00 per day for non-students dressed in blue and \$8.00 per day for students in blue. The price includes round trip transportation to the tournament and general admission tickets to the game. Persons going on the bus need not purchase their tickets separately.

ISUE will play Northern Kentucky University in the opening game of the tournament Sunday, March 5 at 7:00 p.m. At 9:00 p.m. St. Joe will play the host school, Eastern Illinois University. The championship game will be played Monday, March 6 at 9:00 p.m. with the consolation game being played at 7:00 p.m. The winner of the tournament will go on to the quarter-finals of play.

Many student organizations, along with the ISUE Varsity Club are urging that as many people as possible attend the Sunday game to support the Eagles and COACH BOULTINGHOUSE.

ISUE ALUMNI TELEFUND DRIVE ANNOUNCED. More than 2500 alumni of Indiana State University Evansville will be contacted by telephone during the fifth annual ISUE Alumni Association Telefund Drive the first two weeks of March.

Proceeds from the telefund will benefit the alumni scholarship program and other philanthropic projects of the Alumni Association. In addition, the Association plans to pledge \$25,000 to ISUE to aid in construction of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building.
