CAMPUS OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY, OCTOBER 16. Members of the University community and the public are invited to attend ISUE's annual campus Open House on Sunday, October 16, from noon to 3:00 p.m. Highlighting events will be the ribbon cutting for ISUE's new jogging course, performances by the Mid America Singers, a presentation entitled "Growing Up in Evansville", a free fast-pitch softball clinic, student exhibits and demonstrations, exhibits in the University Library, apple butter made the old-fashioned way, and tours of the campus aboard the Royal Foods double-decker bus.

At noon Evansville's two mayoral candidates--Democrat Mike Vandever and Republican Dave Koehler--will leave the mayoral campaign briefly to join the national fitness campaign. They will assist in cutting the ribbon on ISUE's new jogging course which begins immediately South of the Physical Activities Center. Joining the candidates will be Cross Country coach Bill Stegemoller and Cross Country team members who will demonstrate use of the trail. Anyone interested in using the jogging trail is encouraged to attend the demonstration at noon.

The Mid America Singers will perform two mini-concerts at 1:00 and 2:30 p.m. in Forum One of the Administration Building. The group, under the direction of Mrs. Sue Shriber, will perform a medley of songs--from pop and jazz to easy listening and country.

A 45-minute slide/tape presentation, "Growing Up in Evansville", will be presented at 2:00 p.m. in Forum Three of the Administration Building. Dr. Darrel Bigham, ISUE professor of history, has interviewed natives of a number of Evansville neighborhoods--Riverside, Howell, Baptistown, Goosetown, St. Anthony, and Fourth Street, among others--and has compiled their memories of Evansville during the early 20th Century. A panel discussion will follow and participants will learn how a neighborhood's economic and social structure has been influenced by its history.

As part of the Open House activities, a free fast-pitch softball clinic will be offered from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center. Students enrolled in the fifth through eleventh grades can register for the clinic from 1:30 to 2:00 p.m. that day. Parents, coaches, adults, and children are invited to observe the workshop which will emphasize the development of sound fundamental skills in pitching, catching, hitting, bunting and infield/outfield play.

Student, faculty, and community organizations will have exhibits and displays throughout the campus. The Secretaries of ISUE Club will be making apple butter at the Eicher Barn in large copper kettles over an open fire. The public is invited to attend all Open House activities.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Drs. Darrel Bigham and Donald Pitzer, professors of history, were awarded certificates of commendation by Governor Robert D. Orr on September 9 for their service to the celebration of the tricentennial of German immigration to North America (1683-1983).

Dr. Melvin Denner, chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics, has been serving as a delegate from Region 13 to the Indiana Congress on Education. The Congress is attempting to gauge attitudes of communities from selected school districts towards education on the primary and secondary levels. Delegates interview approximately 40-50 persons in each district. The people interviewed reflect a representative sampling of the communities. School districts in Region 13 that are participating in this project include Mt. Vernon, Vincennes, North Posey, and Jasper. Report from all 14 regions will be compiled by the Indianapolis office of the Indiana Congress on Education.

Dr. Walter Hopkins, professor of sociology, and Dr. Charles Barber, professor of political science, participated in the annual meeting of the Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences October 6 and 7 at Indiana University Northwest in Gary. Dr. Hopkins was elected to a three-year term on the Board of Directors. Dr. Barber appeared on the International Studies panel presenting a paper entitled "Indiana Partners and Sister Cities: A Comparison of International Exchange Programs."

Dr. Darrel Bigham, professor of history, participated in the first conference on the status of teaching and writing in Afro-American history which was sponsored by the American Historical Association at Purdue University October 6-8. He also will deliver a paper entitled "The Evansville Argus and Black Evansville, 1938-1943," at the annual meeting of the Indiana Historical Society on November 5.
