Dr. Larry W. Arp, chair of the Information Systems and Business Education Department; **Dr. Joy V. Peluchette**, associate professor of management; and **Dr. Jennifer J. Williams**, assistant professor of computer information systems, have had their article, “The Use of Computer-Aided Instruction for Computer Skills Training: Implications for Student Learning and the Utilization of Institutional Resources,” accepted for publication by the International Business Schools *Computing Quarterly*.

1998 NEH Summer Stipends

Program:

The National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends Program made 130 awards for summer 1997. It is time for the 1998 competition. Applications must be submitted to the vice president for Academic Affairs by September 12. Any eligible faculty or staff member with a humanities project may apply for an NEH Summer Stipend.

The program award is \$4,000 for two consecutive, uninterrupted months of full-time independent study or research. No travel supplement will be available. USI may submit two nominations, one of which must be a junior faculty member (academic applicants at the rank of assistant professor or instructor who are at comparably early stages of their careers). Those holding the rank of associate professor or professor are considered senior nominees.

Nonfaculty college and university staff members are eligible for the summer stipends programs and may apply without nomination, provided they will not be teach-

authorized agent to control, account for, and safeguard cash at the University of Southern Indiana is the Business Office. Specifically, this office is responsible for collecting fees and other income, making all fee refunds, preparing bank deposits, issuing petty cash disbursements, issuing change funds to authorized units, and assessing student fees.

Under no circumstance is an employee to accept money in the name of the University without properly recording the income with an official University receipt. A receipt will be issued by the Cashier's Office for all cash received, except for cash received by approved satellite operations.

Departments that have been approved to accept money are required to issue receipts and make daily deposits. These departments are responsible for maintaining their own receipt subsidiary record on forms that have been approved by the controller.

Loss of any funds should be reported IMMEDIATELY to the Cashier's Office and to the University security department. Questions on cash control procedures should be addressed to the bursar, extension 1842.
