The annual feastes are a re-enactment of a typical English holiday festival, where the king would gather the community of nobles, artisans, and supporters to celebrate conquest, chivalry, and the impending holiday season. This is a fun-filled evening in merry old England, with many new twists and turns that include pitting the king and queen against an unscrupulous court member intent on seeing the humorous demise of his royal highness.

The Feastes will begin at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday and 6 p.m. Sunday in the University Center Dining Room, which will seat 224 each evening. Tickets are \$21 for adults; \$17 for USI students, children, and senior citizens (60-plus).
