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UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN STARTS. The USI 1987-88 United Way campaign opened Monday, November 2, with a goal of \$12,210, a 15 percent increase over last year's outstanding fund drive. The USI United Way Campaign Committee has organized several competitions among the 15 divisions to help boost this campaign. Three "traveling trophies" will be awarded for the first time to: the division with the highest percentage of employees giving, the division with the highest percentage of Fair Share giving, and the division with the highest per capita giving. In addition, any division where all employees make United Way pledges will be awarded a 1987-88 permanent plaque congratulating them on their "100 Percent Commitment to United Way."

Emphasis again is placed on the Fair Share gift, a pledge which represents one half of one percent (.005) of your pre-tax income. Last year, USI employees responded with 41 Fair Share gifts. This year's goal is to increase that total by 50 percent, or 20 additional Fair Share pledges. The campaign committee has created an incentive package called the USI Fair Share Lottery. By pledging your Fair Share, you are eligible to enter the appropriate lottery -- Faculty Fair Share Lottery, \$100 travel stipend; Administrative Fair Share Lottery, choice of \$100 travel stipend or extra vacation day; or Support Staff Fair Share Lottery, extra vacation day.

Someone who works with you will be serving as your United Way Campaign Division Coordinator and will solicit your pledge personally sometime during the next two weeks. Your coordinator will be prepared to show you how your division measured up against the other USI divisions last year.

HUMANITIES LECTURER. The third lecture in a series presented by the USI General Education Reform Committee will be given from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. Thursday, November 12, in SC 254 by **Dr. Jean Gillies**, professor of art history at Northeastern Illinois University. She has been chairman of the Art Department at Northeastern and now is associate coordinator of the Academic Advisement Program. Dr. Gillies is the author of numerous articles and served as project director for the film, "American Women: Daughters of a Dream," which was funded by the National Endowment for the Arts. She received her B.A. in art from Denison University and her Ph.D. in art history from Northwestern University. Dr. Gillies will be at USI Thursday and Friday, spending much of the time in meetings with faculty and classes, and will visit the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science.

Dr. Gillies' visit marks the final lecture in a series funded by a \$20,000 National Endowment for the Humanities grant, approved earlier this year in support of planning

and implementation of a two-course sequence in "The Western Tradition." The grant funded three visiting lecturers in the General Education Reform Committee program being implemented by **Dr. John Gottcent**, professor of English; **Mr. Michael Aakhus**, assistant professor of art; **Dr. Douglas Hubbell**, assistant professor of theater; and **Dr. Richard Mussard**, associate professor of philosophy.

CROSS COUNTRY REGIONAL SATURDAY. USI will be host for the Great Lakes Regional competition in the NCAA Division II Cross Country Championships which will be held Saturday, November 7, at Oak Meadows Golf and Country Club. Nineteen women's and men's teams will participate, the women in a 5,000-meter course at 8:15 a.m. and the men in a 10,000-meter course at 9:30 a.m. Tickets are \$1 for students and \$2 for adults. COMMUNAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE. Nearly 200 scholars, preservationists, and communarians representing 28 historic and current communities attended the 14th annual Historic Communal Societies Conference held October 15-18 at the 19th century Swedish community of Bishop Hill, Illinois, sponsored by the USI Center for Communal Studies. There were 45 presentations made by people from 27 universities and 17 states. The best formal papers will be published in *Communal Societies*, the journal of the National Historic Communal Societies Association. Copies will be available at \$5 each in the USI Center, SC 173. The 15th annual conference will be held October 6-8, 1988, at the colonial Moravian communal site at Winston-Salem, North Carolina. HOSPICE EDUCATION CONFERENCE. "The Spirit of Hospice: Caring for the Terminally Ill" will be the theme for a two-day conference Tuesday and Wednesday, November 10-11, at the University of Evansville Health Science Building. **Dr. Carl Osier** and **Ms. Elizabeth Anne Bailey**, MSN, will present four plenary sessions: Philosophy of Hospice, Family Dynamics and Terminal Care, Symptom Management in Hospice Care, and Grief and Bereavement. They are part of the team at Connecticut Hospice, where the program originated in the U.S. 12 years ago. **Dr. Charles Petranek**, USI professor of sociology who helped organize the local conference, will present a concurrent session, Children and the Grieving Process.
