Visiting artist

The USI Art Club will sponsor the week-long visit Monday-Friday, February 26-March 1, of Mr. Joseph Reeder, a former university art teacher who now works as a professional studio artist in Chicago.

Mr. Reeder spent 23 years as a professor of art — painting, drawing, and two-dimensional design — at Red Deer College in Alberta, Canada. He has exhibited internationally. Mr. Reeder will concentrate on ceramics and mixed media in presenting workshops from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, all in the Ceramics Studio.

Mr. Reeder also will present a slide-illustrated retrospective on his work, including readings from his prose and poetry, at 9 a.m. Monday, February 26, in the Ceramics Studio and 7:30 p.m. Friday, March 1, in the Technology Center woodshop (TC109).
