VISITING ARTISTS PROGRAM JANUARY 30th. A professor of painting at Indiana University will be the featured guest for the the first of two spring semester Visiting Artist programs. Robert Barnes will be the guest artist on January 30 in the ISUE art studios. He will present a talk on his work from 1 to 2 p.m. in FWA II, and meet with the painting class in the Art Center Painting Studio from 6 to 9 p.m. He is a distinguished painter of national reputation and has been represented for many years by the Allan Frumkin Gallery in New York.
