Guests for the 1993 festivities will dine on a traditional roast beef dinner, with each course presented in a processional led by the Mid-America Singers. Dinner will start at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, and at 6 p.m. Sunday.

ACCREDITATION. The Board of Review for Baccalaureate and Higher Degree Programs of the National League of Nursing voted in October to grant initial accreditation to the USI baccalaureate degree program in nursing.

TEACHING FELLOWSHIPS. The James Madison Memorial Fellowship Foundation, a federally-endowed program designed to strengthen instruction about the Constitution, will award \$24,000 fellowships in 1994 for up to two years of full-time master's-level graduate study in the framing and history of the U.S. Constitution. College seniors and graduates who intend to become secondary teachers of American history, government, or social studies are eligible. At least one fellowship is awarded in each state, with a recipient required to teach a minimum of one year for each year of graduate assistance received and attend a summer institute. AREA CODE CHANGE. Beginning December 1, Indiana callers will need to dial "0" or "1" plus the area code plus the seven-digit number on any long-distance call, even those within their own area code. Customers with long-distance programmed services such as speed dialing or call forwarding, or who have numbers programmed to a fax machine, computer, programmable telephone, automatic dialer, PBX system, or alarm equipment will need to reprogram equipment to include the area code, starting December 1.
