JOHN CIARDI. The University community was saddened to learn that **Mr. John Ciardi**, who spent four days last week at USI and in New Harmony as the Enlow Distinguished Humanities Scholar, died of a heart attack at his home in New Jersey Sunday, March 30. The noted poet, translator, and etymologist had spent his last public appearance doing what he enjoyed most -- discussing language and its uses with students, faculty, and the public. The USI Division of Humanities has planned a program at 1 p.m. Wednesday, April 2, in Forum II to celebrate Mr. Ciardi's life and work, honoring the man who it is estimated had touched more than 1,400 lives in the USI and Historic New Harmony communities during his visit March 23-26. Faculty and students will present informal talks on meetings they had with Mr. Ciardi during his visit, which had included numerous informal sessions with USI students.

COMMUNITY OF SCHOLARS. The Biology at the Interface program featuring **Dr. Candace B. Pert**, chief of the Section on Brain Biochemistry in the Clinical Neuroscience Branch, National Institute of Mental Health, will continue through Thursday morning, April 3. Dr. Pert will give a public lecture on "A Chemical Basis for Moods, Emotions, Behavior, and Psychosomatic Health and Illness" at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in UC 350. A reception will follow, sponsored by Sigma Xi National Research Society. Her visit will end with a research seminar on "Shared Molecular Components in the Nervous and Immune Systems" at 9:30 a.m. in Forum II. All lectures are open to the public.

The Division of Business Executive-in-Residence Program will present **Mr. Robert E. Griffin**, chairman of the board of Indian Industries, Inc., and president and chief executive officer of Escalade, Inc., on Thursday, April 3, in the University Conference Center. The program will include coffee and donuts at 9 a.m.; discussion sessions at 9:30 a.m. and 1 p.m.; and luncheon at 12 noon, with Mr. Griffin to be the speaker. All sessions are open to the public.

HUMANITIES FORUM TO FEATURE GERMAN PROFESSOR. **Dr. Harald Husemann**, professor of English and contemporary German history at the University of Osnabruck, West Germany, will present a Humanities Forum lecture at 11 a.m. Friday, April 4, in Forum II. His topic will be "Divided Loyalties in a Divided Country: Collective Guilt for the Holocaust?/Generation Conflict Under the Shadow of History." There will be a "Dutch treat" luncheon in the President's Suite immediately following the lecture for faculty and

students who wish to pursue further areas of interest with the German visitor. Dr. and Mrs. Husemann will be guests of the USI German Department and the Humanities Division for a tour of Historic New Harmony from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. Friday.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. **Dr. Sherry B. Darrell**, assistant professor of English, has been accepted in a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Institute, to be held at Dartmouth College June 28 to August 8. Greek tragedy will be the theme for the six-week institute.

Ms. Catherine H. Fraley, special part-time instructor in French and general studies, has been selected to participate in a Mellon Foundation Regional Faculty Development Seminar at Vanderbilt University in June. The seminar topic will be "Recent Developments in French Theater."

Dr. Robert E. Mays, professor of education, has been selected by the Administration for Children, Youth, and Families -- Head Start Bureau, and the University of Arizona at Tucson to set up and pilot a national testing program utilizing the Head Start Measures Battery (HSMB), a group of developmental measures that assess the cognitive and social skills of children age 3 through 6 years. Dr. Mays also has been selected by the Gibson County (Indiana) Head Start to set up a special parent-focused, home-based demonstration project sponsored by the national Head Start.

FIBER EXHIBITION AT NEW HARMONY. Two contemporary fiber artists -- **Ms. Anne McKenzie Nickolson**, a self-employed artist in Indianapolis, and **Ms. Pat Woodard**, who teaches fiber and fabric courses in the St. Louis area -- will be featured in an exhibition during April at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The exhibition will open Sunday with a reception for the two artists from 1 to 5 p.m., and will continue through April 30.

Ms. Nickolson, who received her M.F.A. degree from Indiana University, will display abstract two-dimensional pieces with hand embroidery on cotton, linen, and painted silk. Ms. Woodard, who received her M.F.A. degree from SIU-Edwardsville, makes large sculptural floor pieces with sticks, twine, and the wool produced by the sheep she raises on her farm near Mascoutah, Illinois.

Ms. Woodward also will conduct a workshop, "Weaving Designs From Nature," on Saturday, April 26, as a program the New Harmony Gallery and the Harmonie Weaving Institute will co-sponsor during the annual New Harmony Springfest weekend. The registration fee is \$25. Interested persons may call the Harmonie Weaving Institute, 682-3578.

She will speak on "Localization of Brain Sites Responsible for Different Barbiturate Effects" at the 3 p.m. program in Room 328, Health Sciences Building, University of Evansville.
