MR. LARRY HOLT, FROM MEAD JOHNSON, TO SPEAK ON INTERVIEWS

On Thursday, October 21, Larry Holt, Director of College Relations at Mead Johnson, will be on campus to speak on the subject of interviews in business and the professions. His speech and an informal session to follow will be in Room 196, at 2:00 p.m. The Business and Professional Speech class, taught by Dr. Helen Sands, will host his appearance on campus. All those interested, both faculty and students, are encouraged to attend and participate. Coffee will be served during the informal session.

LECTURE BY F. EUGENE SMITH

The Evansville Arts and Education Council, in cooperation with the Division of Humanities at Indiana State University-Evansville and University of Evansville's Igleheart Center for the Study of Urban Affairs, is sponsoring an illustrated lecture by Mr. F. Eugene Smith, internationally recognized urban and industrial designer. Currently serving as National Vice-President and member of the Executive Committee of the Industrial Designers Society of America, Smith will present his lecture, "Why Ugliness? Why Not?" on October 27, prior to the convening of the Designers Society's annual meeting at Kentucky Lake. He will speak at 8:00 p.m. in the auditorium of the Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences.

Mr. Smith is a well-known and all-out campaigner against urban ugliness and visual pollution. He has spoken to some 250 groups from coast to coast, presenting slides, suggesting solutions, and urging involvement in order to do something about the problem. He has, in Washington, presented his message to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Department of Agriculture, the Bureau of Public Roads, and the White Staff for Natural Beauty.

He has been recognized by the American Institute of Architects for his contribution in combating ugliness in America and has been appointed to the National Advisory Committee of the National Congress for Beauty.
