Oksoberfest

The USI family and the public are invited to enjoy Oksoberfest, which will be held from 12 noon to 4 p.m. Sunday, October 22, in the Outdoor Education Area, sponsored by the Student Government Association, Activities Programming Board, Welborn Hospital and Mulberry Center, and a variety of merchant neighbors.

This year's event will kick off a fund campaign for a "Safe Ride" program for USI students and be a potential entry in a national alcohol awareness contest which has a top prize of a \$20,000 scholarship for the winning school.

Oksoberfest is an official activity of National Red Ribbon Week and will lead off a week of programs sponsored by various student groups as part of Drug/Alcohol Awareness Week. Tuesday, October 24, is Red Ribbon Day and faculty and staff members are urged to join students in wearing the ribbons. Wendi Fox, comedienne and lecturer, will speak at 9 p.m. Wednesday, October 25, in the Dining Room.

The Sunday Oksoberfest will feature free games and events:

For children — fun with pumpkins, face painting, a puppet show, Warrick County clowns, a balloon toss, sack race, and more. For adults — country line dancing, bingo, tug-of-war, volleyball, horse shoes, and more.

Student organizations will staff a Candyland General Store, the dunking booth — which will open at noon with Coach Bruce Pearl and Coach Chancellor Dugan taking the first turns on the bar — and other student-fundraiser booths. Proceeds will go to the "Safe Ride" campaign, which SGA wants to make available for the spring semester. "Safe Ride" will pay cab fare for USI stu-

dents caught in a variety of emergency situations — assault, vehicle breakdown, drinking incidents, for example — where a student needs a cab ride but has no money to pay for it. The University reimburses the cab company, then bills the student later for the fare.

Dr. John W. Byrd, vice president for Student Affairs, and Mr. James W. Browning, counseling director, will cook the hamburgers and hot dogs supplied by local businesses. 5 USI sports ranked in polls

For the first time in the history of the Athletic Department, which was created in 1971, USI has five of its teams ranked nationally at one time.

Both the men's and women's cross country teams are at 20th place and the men's soccer team is at 25th in their respective Top 25 rankings for the season. In preseason rankings, the men's basketball team is ranked first in four polls and the women's team is ranked third in the Division II Bulletin.

In the 1990s, the Screaming Eagles have been ranked nationally in men's and women's basketball, baseball, men's and women's cross country, men's golf, men's soccer, and softball, with six teams making post-season appearances in their respective NCAA Division II Tournaments. In 1995, men's basketball became the first sport to win a national title.
