



USI Theatre plans busy season

Mr. Eric Overmyer's fantasy, *On the Verge*, will open a busy 1994-95 season for the USI Theatre. This fall also will see the University thespians doing Shakespeare, and next spring, Chekhov and Ionesco.

On the Verge will be presented October 6-16. Mr. Overmyer's fantasy is a poetically-charged absurdist comedy. The play follows the trek of three 19th-century women explorers who traverse a region they call "terra incognita," the last unexplored area on the planet. To their surprise, their terrain becomes the future century, a random stream of linguistic slang, fashion trends, and forgotten inventions — all presented along a roller coaster ride filled with wit, sentiment, and unique insight.

Mr. William Shakespeare explored the dynamic relationship between nature and art in *The Tempest*, which will be presented November 10-20. The plot follows the trials of a band of shipwrecked noblemen and servants who find themselves on a secluded and seemingly uninhabited island. Mysterious and unexplained events both enchant and frighten the unwilling visitors, unaware that Prospero, their banished Duke, now inhabits the uncharted isle and has used his magical powers to arrange this encounter. Prospero's desire to

Storytelling feature of conference

The Learning Edge III conference on innovative approaches to using language and literature in the K-8 classrooms will be held Saturday, October 1, in the Wright Administration Building, sponsored by USI Extended Services.

"Tellin' Tales" will be the theme with the conference held in conjunction with a storytelling festival sponsored by the Arts Council of Southwest Indiana.

Mr. Bobby Norfolk, performer, writer, director in children's television, and a contributing author to the recently published *Writer's Choice*, will headline "Tellin' Tales" and also will conduct a late-morning storytelling workshop for the Learning Edge conference. Mr. Norfolk is a former park ranger and comedian who has become a master storyteller and has won three Emmys for his work in children's television.

"Telling Tales" programs will be held in the afternoon and evening, all open to the public. Learning Edge participants may attend any or all of the sessions free of charge. Both afternoon and evening sessions are open to the public; admission is \$3 in the afternoon, and \$3 for adults, \$1 for children in the evening.

Highway opening September 26

A major milestone is coming at the end of September, as the Vanderburgh County Commissioners plan a ribbon-cutting ceremony to open the Highway 62 overpass/entrance to USI.

The ceremony will be held at 12 noon on Monday, September 26, sponsored by the commissioners — Mr. Rick Borries, Mr. Don Hunter, and Mr. Pat Tuley. University officials will participate.

The new bridge and three of the ramps are expected to open that afternoon. The next morning, the temporary campus entrance just west of the bridge will be closed to allow work to be completed on the fourth ramp, which will become the primary campus access for eastbound traffic.

Work on the fourth ramp is expected to take four weeks and during that period, eastbound traffic is urged to reach the campus by the Schutte Road-Clarke Lane access. DO NOT use McDowell Road; the private road at Solarbron Pointe is not open to through traffic.

After the ribbon-cutting, westbound traffic entering the campus and all traffic leaving the campus will be able to use the new interchange.

Work will continue in some areas of the newly opened interchange, so motorists are urged to use the new overpass with extreme caution and please continue to observe the 45 m.p.h. speed limit.

forgive the past is the basis for his plan and in executing it, he renews his hope for lasting peace and understanding for mankind.

The spring season will open February 16-26 with *The Seagull* by Mr. Anton Chekhov. This classic observes the familial relationships and personal struggles of a younger generation in pursuit of dreams for success and desire for love. Set within the social malaise of the Russian gentry's historical decline, Mr. Chekhov's unique artistry casts an oddly comic light upon a world of petty pretentiousness, a world where love and

indifference, passion and despair must coexist like members of an eccentric family, where even the purest impulses must succumb to uncertainty — a world where hearts can only break.

The final production, *The Chairs*, acknowledges the recent death of the noted playwright, Mr. Eugene Ionesco, and celebrates his life and innovative work. It will be presented March 30 through April 9. "What is the meaning of life?" is the significant question Mr. Ionesco poses with this play. His "answers" are acted out in the exchanges between two old people preparing for the arrival of an orator. The play's conclusion reflects

Mr. Ionesco's distinctive dramatic vision and vividly expresses his essential ideas on society, materialism, and isolation.

The 1994-95 performances will be at 8 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 2 p.m. Sundays at USI Theatre, 3001 Igleheart Avenue. Ticket prices will remain the same: \$5 for the University community and senior citizens, and \$7 for general admission.
