ALL FAITH SEDER SUPPER AT ISUE. People of all denominations are invited to the traditional Jewish Passover family meal, the Seder, at ISUE's Cafeteria on April 2 at 6:30 p.m.

The Seder Supper, conducted by Mrs. Jean Mann and DR. RICHARD WHITMAN, is a joyful feast which must have children present to be authentic. The ritual foods and prayers will be demonstrated, followed by a full

course meal accompanied by prescribed prayers. A game for children is included in the ceremonial aspect. Since it is a family meal, families are encouraged to attend.

Passover is a celebration of the Hebrews' liberation from slavery in Egypt with many rites and symbols connected with it. At the Seder Supper the symbolism will be explained. The Seder is not only devotional; it combines serious observations on Jewish life and destiny with poetry and light-heartedness.

The meal will include matzo ball soup, roast chicken and matzo ball dressing, broccoli, fruit cup and macaroons, and wine.

Sponsoring the Seder Supper is the ISUE Campus Ministry in cooperation with Reverend George Hughes, the Office of Continuing Education, and the ISUE Jewish community. Reservations may be made by calling the Office of Continuing Education at extension 1863. The cost for adults is \$5.00. Children under 12 will be served at half price. Admission is limited to 40 people.

ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT SEMINAR. On Thursday, March 22, DR. ANDREW JORGENSEN, assistant professor of chemistry, will discuss "Energy: Uses, Costs, and Conservation" at the Energy and Environment lecture series. JORGENSEN'S lecture will include how the consumer can monitor and calculate his energy use, and how much energy is costing him. He will also present a strategy for conservation to aid consumers in cutting their energy expenses.
