WSWI HONORS JOE HULGUS

The WSWI staff held its first annual awards banquet on April 21 and presented the first Golden Summit Award for spirit and devotion to the media to Mr. Joe Hulgus, host of the station's weekly *Big Band Review*. The award will become the Joe Hulgus Golden Summit Award in the future, honoring the man who has emceed two hours of big band reminiscing each Saturday for the past seven years, drawing from his personal collection of 450 90-minute tapes.

The award originally was presented during Honors Week ceremonies in March and became the focal point of a WSWI banquet to honor the staff of the student-operated station. Other awards included: most valuable person - Mr. John Pfeffer, senior; outstanding disc jockery - Mr. Phil Crow, junior; outstanding newscaster - Ms. Debi Byers, senior; best newcomer - Ms. Tammi Harrison, junior; and distinctive personality - Mr. Brian Greenwell, junior.

Mr. Hulgus retired in 1986 as director of the union benefits program for United Mine Workers of America. He also does "color" for WSWI baseball games and has a DJ business, playing big band music for class reunions, parties, wedding receptions, and anniversaries. Mr. Hulgus' love for the big bands took root in his childhood back in Colver, Pennsylvania. His family used to drive to the old Sunset Ballroom, which could hold 5,000 dancers, and park near an open window to listen to the music. He later spent many nights inside the ballroom,

dancing to the music of such greats as Glenn Miller, Artie Shaw, and Tommy Dorsey. Mr. Hulgus' collection began years later, when he came across a recording of Duke Ellington at the Sunset and realized he was there the night it was made. He now scours record stores, flea markets, and yard sales for old records, transcribing them to tape for preservation.

SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT.

The University participates each summer in a Summer Youth Employment Program which provides work experience designed primarily for economically disadvantaged youths, ages 14-21. They work on campus at selected job sites enabling them to learn skills and develop better work habits. At the same time, they are introduced to an institution of higher education.

This year's program will begin June 17 and continue through August 9. The youths can work between 20 to 37.5 hours a week and earn \$4.25 an hour. The program requires close supervision of the workers.

HEALTH NOTES from the Human Resources Department

Cancer Prevention - Avoid those factors that might lead to the development of cancer.

Smoking - Cigarette smoking is responsible for 85 percent of lung cancer cases among men and 75 percent among women, and accounts for about 30 percent of all cancer deaths. Those who smoke two or more packs of cigarettes a day have lung cancer mortality rates 15 to 25 times greater than nonsmokers.

Alcohol - Oral cancer and cancers of the larynx, throat, esophagus, and liver occur more frequently among heavy drinkers.

Smokeless tobacco - Use of chewing tobacco or snuff increases risk of cancer of the mouth, larynx, throat, and esophagus and is highly habit forming.
