EDITOR-IN-RESIDENCE ANNOUNCED. William R. Burleigh, former editor of The Evansville Press who now is president and general editorial manager of Scripps-Howard Newspapers in Cincinnati, will be featured as the Editor-In-Residence at ISUE on Friday, March 29, sponsored by the communications faculty of the Division of Humanities. He will meet with students from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 to 2 p.m., and speak at a noon luncheon in the University Conference Center. The luncheon is \$4 for the public, \$3 for the ISUE family (students, faculty or staff). Reservations may be made by calling extension 1734.

Burleigh is an Evansville native who started work at The Press while still in high school, returning there after his graduation from Marquette University (magna cum laude in journalism) in 1957. He moved through the ranks from reporter to editor by 1975, and left in 1977 to become editor of the Cincinnati Post. He has held his present position since January, 1984. Burleigh was presented an honorary Doctor of Letters from ISU in 1979, and has won numerous awards for journalistic excellence.

ANNUAL SEDER SUPPER SLATED. The ISUE Campus Ministry will sponsor the 8th annual Seder Supper, celebrating the Jewish Passover, at the University Home on Thursday, March 28. The Seder will be conducted by Regina Heit, cantor of the Adath B'Nai Israel Temple, and congregation members Jeanne and Linda Ellenstein. All members of the University family, as well as the public, are invited to participate in this traditional Passover celebration. APPOINTMENTS APPROVED. Three appointments to the ISUE faculty and staff were approved at the last ISU Board meeting in Terre Haute.

Jonathan Soard was retained as the director of the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, under the new ISUE-Historic New Harmony affiliation. Soard is a 1978 graduate of Indiana University (B.F.A. in printmaking) and has been at New Harmony since 1979, first as exhibits preparator and since June 1983, as director. He also has studied at the University of Evansville, ISU, University of Louisville, Smithsonian Institution, Gordon

College in Massachusetts, and American Academy of Art in Chicago, and has participated in one-man, invitational or group exhibitions on local, state and national levels. He has been active in numerous professional ways, including as instructor, advisor or consultant, with various Evansville area organizations.

Dr. Sang T. Choe, former associate professor of business at ISUE, will resume that position in August, returning here from SIU at Carbondale, where he has been teaching marketing. Dr. Choe is a graduate of Keimyung University, Daegu, Korea (B.A., 1972), American Graduate School of International Management, Glendale, Arizona (M.I.M., 1974), North Texas State University, Denton, Texas (M.B.A., 1977), and Mississippi State University, Jackson (D.B.A., 1981). He was an instructor at Mississippi State for two years before he first came to ISUE as an assistant professor of business in 1981.

Diane B. Marcus is the new academic systems analyst in the Computer Center. She is a graduate of Kean College, New Jersey (B.A., 1976) and completed her second major in computer science there in 1982. She was a systems analyst for American Telephone & Telegraph in Piscataway, New Jersey, from 1982 to 1984, and previously worked in accounting positions with New Jersey firms. She lives at 5741 Woodridge Place in Evansville.

RECEPTION PLANNED FOR ARTIST. A reception will be held from 2 to 4 p.m. Sunday, March 31, at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art for Ron Markman, whose ongoing installation piece, Mukfa, will be on display there through April 7. Markman is a professor of painting at Indiana University at Bloomington. His exhibit is a continually growing installation of about 70 wall and floor pieces, which document the fictitious island of Mukfa. It is enhanced by a 20-minute videotape. While none of Mukfa is for sale, Markman's print, Cityscape, is available. Gallery hours are 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday (closed Monday).

HUMANITIES FORUMS. Barbara Crane, an internationally-known photographer whose appearance at ISUE in early March was canceled by snow, now is slated to be here Monday, March 25. In the 1 p.m. program in Forum Two, she will present slides of her bodies of work, illustrating how they developed and the relationships between them. A professor of photography at the School of Art Institute of Chicago since 1967, she has had work included in the collections of the Museum of Modern Art, the New Museum, the Getty Museum, the International Museum of Photography at the George Eastman House, and others. She now is on sabbatical, conducting workshops and traveling in China and Israel.

In a second Forum next week, Dr. Ben Eklof, associate professor of history at Indiana University, will speak at 12 noon Thursday, March 28 in UC 350. He will take a critical look at the quantity and quality of change in the Soviet Union's standard of living and how Soviet citizens feel about these

changes. The argument is made that, despite the incontestable improvement in living conditions, most Soviets believe their country is going to the dogs. His lecture will try to explain the connection between popular conceptions and objective indicators.

Dr. Eklof will draw from his background of having lived and studied extensively in the Soviet Union. He is the author of numerous publications on Russian history. He received his B.A. at Middlebury College and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Princeton University. He has received numerous awards for his work, including a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship in 1969, Fulbright-Hays fellowships in 1972 and 1982, and a Lilly Teaching Fellowship in 1981.

RED CROSS BLOOD DRIVE STARTS MONDAY. The Red Cross will conduct a blood drive on campus Monday and Tuesday, March 25-26 in the University Conference Center. Donors are urged to eat before their appointments.

MESSAGE FROM STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES. The Indiana State Board of Health has indicated that measles disease is occurring on several college and university campuses in the U.S. Of particular concern is a measles outbreak in Lake City, Florida, that has spread to up to 12 Florida counties, in view of the number of students who spent spring break in Florida.

Measles is a viral illness that is spread through droplets from the respiratory tracts of infected, contagious persons. The virus incubates in susceptible persons for nine to 12 days before onset of symptoms, which include fever accompanied by a cough, runny nose or watery eyes. A red raised rash follows, generally beginning on the face or upper body and spreading to cover most of the body for three to 10 days. Victims are usually contagious up to four days prior to the rash onset, and up to four days after the eruption.

Any ISUE students who experience a temperature of 101 degrees or above, associated with cold symptoms, are encouraged to notify Sandra Lawrence, RN, in Student Health Services.
