**HUMANITIES FORUM.** On November 21, at 12:00 noon in Room 34 of the Administration Building, *James R. Blevins*, Chairman of the Division of Humanities and Associate Professor of English, will discuss "The Liveliest Art and Why We Teach It," in the Humanities Forum series. Although we have grown up with the movies, our appreciation can be sharpened by a systematic approach to film literacy, for film language and conventions are different from literary ones. *Dr. Blevins* will argue with *Pauline Kael's* notion that "if you don't think that film can be killed, you don't know the power of education."

The Humanities Forum is open to the public. Meetings generally do not exceed one hour in length and include ample time for questions.

**ISUE SPEECH MEET.** On Saturday, November 22, 1975, the Communications Forum and the Communications Arts Club will sponsor a High School Speech Meet on the ISUE campus. The all-day activity is scheduled from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., and will take place in classrooms throughout the campus. Students from all of the Evansville high schools and schools in the surrounding area have been invited to participate. An estimated 250 students are expected.

Entrants will compete in the following categories: Broadcasting; Boys' Extemporaneous; Girls' Extemporaneous; Dramatic, Humorous and Oratorical Interpretation; Impromptu; Original Oratory; and Poetry. Ribbons will be awarded to the top five speakers in each category. Trophies will be presented to the schools with the highest number of points. Judging the Meet will be Speech coaches from the high schools, members of the ISUE faculty, and ISUE Communications students.

**RAMSEY CLARK TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS.** Ramsey Clark, former Attorney General of the United States, will speak on November 25, 1975, at 7:30 p.m. in Room 126. Mr. Clark's appearance is in participation with the Civil Liberties and Crime Control Forums, sponsored by ISUE's Center for Law Focused Education, Public Action for Correctional Effort, and the Southwest Indiana Civil Liberties Union in cooperation with the Indiana Committee for the Humanities and The National Endowment for the Humanities. The purpose of the Conference is to explore potential conflicts between crime control and protection of civil liberties. Conference planners explain, "It is particularly appropriate at this, our Nation's Bicentennial, that we learn how we might better bring law enforcement and civil rights into harmony."

Ramsey Clark, Deputy Attorney General under President Lyndon B. Johnson and Attorney General until 1969, is presently in private law practice, while also writing and teaching in New York and Washington, D.C. Since serving as Attorney General, he has participated in many civil liberties activities.

At this final lecture of the Civil Liberties and Crime Control Forums, Mr. Clark will speak on Senate Bill I, proposed by Nixon's Attorneys General, and how individuals' rights are affected and how it relates to several Watergate topics. The Forum will be open to the public.
