CIVIL LIBERTIES LEADER TO SPEAK

Ms. Sheila Kennedy, executive director of the Indiana Civil Liberties Union in Indianapolis, will discuss civil liberties at 12 noon Friday, February 26, in a political science class meeting in OC2009. The public is invited. **Mr. David Woll**, lecturer in political science and instructor of the class, said participants are invited to bring a brown-bag lunch and join Ms. Kennedy and him for continued discussion after the class.

Ms. Kennedy, a graduate of Indiana University School of Law, was a Republican candidate for Congress in the 11th District in 1980 and later served as city corporation counsel for Indianapolis Mayor William Hudnut.

CONTACT YOUR LEGISLATOR . . .

A bill coming to a vote in the Indiana House on Thursday, February 25, would allow the 77 Indiana counties on eastern standard time to switch to eastern daylight time in the summer, leaving the 15 counties which observe central time an hour behind the rest of the state all year long. This change would have a major impact on ticket sales at Lincoln Amphitheatre, since most of the counties in our market area would be an hour ahead of Spencer County. Many guests would have to juggle the dual time zones.

We suggest that University employees express an opinion on this time change, possibly using this message: "This is (name). I am calling on behalf of the Lincoln Amphitheatre located in Spencer County. I urge you to vote against the daylight savings time measure, House Bill 1745. We feel it would hurt the tourism industry in southern Indiana because the bill would impose two time zones on counties that are working together to market the area as a vacation destination for tour and family groups."

MAKE THE RIGHT CHOICE -- HELPING STUDENTS AT TEST TIME

March is the month for ISTEP (Indiana Statewide Testing for Educational Progress) testing in grades two, three, six, eight, and nine. Test dates are March 1-10. ISTEP measures achievement in reading, English, math, social studies, and science. Test results are mailed to parents in May. Students who score below the state cutoff are required to attend summer school and retake the test before they will be promoted to the next grade.

Parents can help during test time in these ways: encourage children to take the test seriously; require them to go to bed early the night before the test so they will be rested; barring illness or emergency, make sure they are in school on test day; ask your child about the tests. When results are received in May, call the school if an explanation is needed. Test results are not always easy to understand and schools want to help. If your child is required to attend summer school, please support the summer program.
