Freudenburg 2004 Distinguished Professor

An internationally recognized mathematician who excels as both a teacher and scholar, Dr. Gene Freudenburg has been named Integra Bank's 2004 Distinguished Professor at USI.

The award, announced March 25 at the Pott School of Science and Engineering's Honors Program, will be formally presented May 9 during Commencement.

An associate professor of mathematics, Freudenburg has been part of the USI faculty since 1995. In class, he encourages students to think critically and to process information using logical thought, algebraic skills, and conceptual knowledge.

His accomplishments in research are documented in numerous prestigious mathematics publications, and his first book has an anticipated publication date in 2005. His research project, "Algebraic Automorphisms of Affine Space," is supported by a National Science Foundation grant.

Freudenburg's interests include commutative algebra and algebraic geometry, derivatives of polynomial rings, algebraic group actions, and invariant theory. He is considered one of the leading experts on locally nilpotent derivations.

At USI he teaches entry-level mathematics courses; Calculus I, II, and III; Theory of Numbers; Modern Abstract Algebra I and II; Linear Algebra; Differential Equations; and independent studies in point set topology and analysis.

On campus, he also has served as chair of the Faculty and Academic Affairs Committee, the University Assessment Committee, the Review Committee for Science and Engineering Research and Grants Awards, and as alternate representative to the Faculty Senate.

Freudenburg holds a Ph.D. in mathematics from Washington University, an M.S. from St. Louis University, and a B.A. from Valparaiso University. Before coming to USI, he taught at Ball State University.

The Distinguished Professor Award is made possible by a generous gift from Integra Bank, and the recipient is chosen by colleagues on the USI faculty. The award honors significant achievement in teaching, scholarship, and service.

As Distinguished Professor, Freudenburg will receive a grant from Integra, select a student to receive a scholarship in his name, and deliver the Distinguished Professor lecture during the 2004-05 academic year.

Slavkin honored for community service

Dr. Michael Slavkin, assistant professor of education, received the Sydney L. and Sadelle Berger Faculty Community Service Award March 23 during the Bower-Suhrheinrich School of Education and Human Services Honors Program.

Presented by the USI Faculty and Academic Affairs Committee, the award recognized Slavkin's dedicated efforts to

improve educational opportunities for young people and to prevent juvenile firesetting.

For the past three years, Slavkin has donated many hours to the Stanley Hall Enrichment Center, where he is service learning coordinator, developed an extensive mentor-mentee program, conferred with students and teachers, and monitored community projects involving both Stanley Hall and USI students.

He also is vice president on the Board of Directors of Hands on Discovery Children's Museum in Evansville and serves as a resource for the New Harmony School Corporation.

In 2001, Slavkin created and served as first president of the Vanderburgh County Juvenile Firesetter Task Force, which provides intervention and works with juvenile courts, fire service, police, and mental health organizations. He also serves as head research coordinator for the State of Indiana Fire Marshal's Office, and his work in the field of juvenile firesetting has received national recognition.

At USI, his efforts have included coordinating the Wonderful World of Student Wellness Fair, co-facilitating freshmen orientation sessions, and co-facilitating Southern Hospitality Days for the Department of Teacher Education.

He also was instrumental in developing the Elementary Transition to Teaching Program for the Department of Teacher Education and has taken an active role in the department's Curriculum Committee and Unit Assessment Committee.

Slavkin holds a Ph.D. in educational psychology from Indiana University-Bloomington, an M.A. from St. Louis University, and a B.A. from DePauw University. He joined USI in 2000.

Journalist to discuss CBS career

An Emmy Award-winning journalist will share her experiences as a CBS News correspondent during a public lecture at 7 p.m. April 5 in Mitchell Auditorium in the Health Professions Center.

Earlier in the day Martha Teichner will lead a question-and-answer session with USI students interested in combining politics and journalism in careers. The Q&A will be held from 3 to 4 p.m. in Kleyemeyer Hall in the Liberal Arts Center.

A correspondent for CBS News *Sunday Morning* since 1994, Teichner's reports on Princess Diana's death, the Detroit newspaper strike, and a factory workers' lawsuit against the Maytag Co. earned four Emmy Awards.

Her career with CBS News began in 1977 at the Atlanta Bureau. Before joining *Sunday Morning* in New York, she completed assignments at the Dallas and London bureaus.

Teichner's assignments have included reporting on the war in Bosnia, the fall of Communism in Central and Eastern Europe, the Romanian Revolution, Nelson Mandela's release from prison, the end of apartheid, and the Persian Gulf War.

A Michigan native, she graduated from Wellesley College in 1969 with a bachelor's in economics. She also attended University of Chicago's Graduate School of Business Administration. Teichner resides in New York.

USI's Department of Communications and Department of Philosophy and Political Science are sponsoring Teichner's appearances on campus with additional support from the acting dean of the School of Liberal Arts and the vice president of Academic Affairs.

Researcher reveals tobacco secrets

A former researcher for Philip Morris will discuss the addictive nature of nicotine, and the tobacco industry's attempt to hide important health information from the public in a program at 6 p.m. April 7 in Carter Hall.

From 1980 to 1984, Victor DeNoble headed a secret lab in Virginia for Philip Morris, maker of Marlboro cigarettes. In his presentation, DeNoble will discuss the experiments he led on rats while exploring the effects of nicotine on the brain and central nervous system.

The free event is being sponsored by Nix the Fix, the USI Coalition sponsored by Smokefree Indiana with funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The public is invited to attend.

Prints recall historic journey

Historic New Harmony will host a reception and special showing of the Maximilian Bodmer Collection, a permanent installation of 81 etchings and aquatints by Swiss artist Karl Bodmer, from 4 to 6 p.m. April 3 at the Lichtenberger Building in downtown New Harmony.

The 81 prints - part of an 1840-43 three-volume French edition of Prince Maximilian of Weid's *Travels in the Interior of North America* - have been widely featured during the past year as part of the publicity surrounding the bicentennial of Lewis and Clark's 1804 expedition into the newly acquired Louisiana Purchase.

The exhibition, located in the Lichtenberger Building (c. 1845), was installed in the 1980s and includes a complete set of prints from Maximilian's *Travels*, documenting the flora, fauna,

and native people encountered along the expedition conducted by Maximilian between the years 1832-34. The expedition wintered in New Harmony from October 1832 to March 1833 and attempted to retrace the steps of Lewis and Clark.

Since Lewis and Clark had little visual documentation of their travels, Bodmer's sketches, etchings, and aquatints are considered some of the best and most accurate depictions of plants, animals, and Native American life west of the Mississippi River from the early 19th century.

A few years after Maximilian's expedition, Native American tribes began feeling the full force of American "Manifest Destiny" through seizure of their ancestral lands by the U.S. Government and the spread of diseases conveyed by the Europeans and Americans who settled their lands.

Web tips

"Spring Cleaning" by Ed Scharf, Web developer

This week we officially ring in the start of spring. The change of seasons is traditionally seen as a time of rebirth, when the deadwood is cleared to make room for new blossoms; when the harshness of winter naturally eliminates the weak and bolsters the strong. How, might you ask, does this relate to something as inorganic as a Web site? Actually, the connection is pretty straightforward.

Just as we take this cue from Mother Nature to clean out our garages, attics, and basements, we should set aside some time to do something about the deadwood on our Web pages. Like the boxes of broken gadgets and out-of-fashion clothes that needlessly clutter our homes, broken links (also known as "dead" links) are usually looked at as a peripheral annoyance that if ignored will someday, somehow, just disappear. However, nothing is more frustrating for a visitor to a Web site than pages that don't load and links that lead nowhere.

The University recently implemented the upgrade from Campus Pipeline to "MyUSI," so there's already an incentive to take some time to revisit your Web pages and update your links. It is essential that the transition to MyUSI be smooth, and one way to make the change as seamless as possible is to check your pages to make sure all references and links to "Campus Pipeline" have been updated to "MyUSI." This will help to eliminate needless confusion.

Dreamweaver and FrontPage both offer tools to check and update links. In Dreamweaver, you can simply click "Check Links Sitewide" under the "Site" menu. The link checker will automatically scan your folder for broken links (links to files not found), external links (links to outside pages), and orphaned links (files with no incoming links). In the case of broken and orphaned links, the link checker will identify any offending pages making it simple to root out any problems. For external links, the link checker will supply you with the Web address but does not verify whether the link is still viable, so you'll have to check those links.

FrontPage makes it just as simple to check your pages, not only for the status of all your links but also for pages that load slowly, haven't been modified in a while, and much more. Simply

click the "Reports" icon in the "Views" bar on the far left. Once you're in Reports view, you can utilize the extensive drop down menu in the "Reporting" toolbar. If the toolbar isn't displayed, simply go to the "View" menu, select "Toolbars," and then "Reporting."

While these tools are incredibly thorough, it also helps to go to the site as a user, as if you've never been there before. Spend some time surfing your pages, clicking links, and reading your content to make sure everything is not only working properly but also is timely and makes sense. It's a great way to make quick fixes and eliminate the deadwood.
