UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA
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SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT HONORS DR. RICE. The Faculty Council honored USI President **David L. Rice** with the establishment in his name of a scholarship endowment, for which more than \$20,000 already has been contributed or pledged by the faculty, staff, and friends. Announcement for the surprise endowment was made at the University's 20th birthday celebration and campus Open House on Sunday, September 15. Contributions still are being accepted by the USI Foundation.

Dr. Walter Everett, immediate past chairman of the Faculty Council, made the announcement as some 200 faculty, staff, and friends of the University gathered for a reception given by the USI Foundation. He said the project was started last spring after legislation was signed changing ISUE to USI. It was apparent special recognition should be given to President Rice, he said, after many individuals and organizations were recognized for their role in the development of Indiana's sixth state university. The Faculty Council raised the first \$1,000, then asked other staff and friends of the University to join the effort. "Virtually every person we approached praised the idea and the recipient," Dr. Everett said.

He said he spoke for the faculty, staff, and friends in expressing appreciation to President Rice for his "balanced guidance of the University, for his insight into the struggles of bringing the University to its present state of success, for his persistent dedication to the task of developing the University, for his example of community leadership, and for his personal demeanor of humility and respect toward the faculty."

The David L. Rice Scholarship Endowment will fund scholarships for students of promise, regardless of their financial needs or place of residence. The amount awarded will be 85 percent of the interest earned annually by the endowment fund. Students may hold the scholarship for as long as four years, if a 3.2 grade point average is maintained while carrying a minimum of 12 hours each semester. April 1 will be the annual deadline to apply for the scholarship.

UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN SET. Wednesday, September 25, will be the official kick-off date for the 1985 United Way campaign at USI. **Ms. Judy Beck** of the Registrar's Office and development director **Wayne Boultinghouse** are in charge of the USI campaign and ask the faculty, staff, and students to remember that "each of us is touched by a United Way agency in some manner

during the year. The University is assuming a leadership position and the United Way campaign is a gauge by which we are judged. When an associate calls on you to participate in the United Way, please listen and consider the many ways this organization serves the needs of our community. After you learn the facts, you will feel good about making your fair share contribution to the United Way."

Ms. Beck said a campaign representative has been designated in each department to assist in a fund drive striving for total University involvement.

BLOOD PRESSURE CHECKS SUCCESSFUL. Mrs. Sandi Lawrence, Health Services director, reports the blood pressure screening on Thursday, September 12, was successful, with 59 students, 72 staff members, and three visitors stopping by the University Conference Center. Of those 134, she said they found 20 persons with borderline hypertension and one with high blood pressure. All were advised to see their physicians, and to get regular blood pressure checks on campus in the future. Mrs. Lawrence provides that service by appointment.

She notes high blood pressure is a problem that can be avoided, if caught early. She said they were able to perform that service at Open House Sunday, when their screening of 46 campus visitors turned up three persons who had high blood pressure and were not aware of it.
