John D. Lippert to be Executive-in-Residence

Mr. John D. Lippert, chairman and chief executive officer of National City Bancshares, Inc., will be the fall Executive-in-Residence for the School of Business. He will speak at 9:05 and 10:35 a.m. Thursday, October 12, in Mitchell Auditorium on the topic "Strategic Planning: No Longer an Option but a Must."

Mr. Lippert will outline why "today's business environment requires a clear and precise roadmap of where the organization is going and how it is going to get there." He will cover what a strategic plan is, how to put a plan together, what it should look like, and the results of implementing a strategic plan in concert with the business plan.

Mr. Lippert is a Michigan native who has been in banking since he worked as a parttime messenger in Saginaw 44 years ago. After serving in the Infanty in Korea, he returned to Second National Bank of Saginaw and worked in several areas, then became a bank examiner with the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.

He attended Ferris State University and the University of Michigan and holds the standard certificate from the American Institute of Banking. He held senior positions in several Michigan banks until becoming president and CEO of the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas at the age of 38. Seven years later he was recruited by National City Bank of Evansville, where he rose to chairman and CEO and now is responsible for National City Bancshares, Inc., a one-billiondollar holding company serving the Tri-State.

New Harmony exhibit

"Golden Memories," an exhibit highlighting the theatrical careers of Grace and Frances Golden, will be on display through October in Dormitory No. 2 in New Harmony. It features original photographs, playbooks, musical scores, costume accessories, and other memorabilia dating from 1890 to 1952, and was organized by Ms. Patricia Sides, assistant curator of the New Harmony state Historic Site and project historian.

Grace and Frances were the youngest members of a New Hamony-based family who performed as the widely-acclaimed Golden Troupe, touring 13 states from 1872 to 1885. Grace later achieved celebrity status in New York City as an opera singer, while Frances helped organize the Community Players of Evansville (now Civic Theatre, Inc.) following her own national stage career.

The exhibit was made possible through an Indiana Heritage Research Grant supported by the Indiana Historical Society and the Indiana Humanities Council. It is included in the daily tour program operated by Historic New Harmony. Tickets may

Effective with the 1995 fall semester, all new students at state-supported universities must comply with the immunization requirements of Indiana Public Law 192. As of September 28, 2,815 students at USI were not in compliance with the immunization requirements. Any non-compliance student will not be allowed to pre-register November 6-17 for 1996 Spring Semester classes.
