ChemTV brings twist, shout to science education

An innovative science education program called *Dow ChemTV* will have students at Reitz High School on their feet, taking a fresh look at chemistry and other sciences.

The program will be staged at 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 2, in the Reitz auditorium. The local presentation is sponsored by the USI Chemistry Department and the Indiana-Kentucky Border Section of the American Chemical Society (ACS), and is open to the public. Contact Dr. Marie G. Designed to capture the imagination of today's teens, *ChemTV* is a high-tech live science theater production that uses music, comedy, and an interactive format to show the vital role chemistry plays in every-day life, from our environment, to our bodies, to the products we use. *ChemTV* battles the youthful perception that science is not relevant in their lives by showing how it is used to improve the quality of life and develop solutions to many of the health, environmental, economic, and other social issues that concern teens. It was created with the assistance of chemistry teachers and the ACS education division to assure high educational standards.

"Whether or not teens plan to pursue careers in chemistry, they need to be able to understand the world around them and that means understanding science and its applications," explains Mr. Doug Draper, director of Dow external communications. Evansville is one of more than 100 cities to host the show during its two-year tour of high schools in the U.S. and Canada. Mr. Draper said Dow will make a free video available to schools that can't be reached with a live performance.

Academic Skills tutoring programs have been recertified for five years by the College Reading and Learning Association's International Tutor Certification Program. The programs originally were certified in 1992 for one year and received a three-year recertification in 1993. In order to be certified the tutoring programs must meet rigid tutoring training standards which are approved by CRLA. There are three levels of certification: the Academic Skills Tutoring Programs, e.g., English (Writing); reading/study skills, and mathematics are certified at Regular/Level 1. The upper levels are usually awarded to programs who use graduate students as tutors.

Freeland, Gouard named All-American

USI junior forward/center LeAnn Freeland was named All-American by Kodak and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, while senior guard/forward Stan Gouard was named National Association of Basketball Coaches NCAA Division II Player of the Year for the second season in a row.

Ms. Freeland becomes only the third female athlete in USI history to be named All-American in two consecutive seasons. Last year, she was named All-American, College Sports Division II Player of the Year, and the Great Lakes Valley Conference Player of the Year.

Freeland also was named third team Academic All-American by GTE and CoSIDA last week. She broke the USI career record for scoring with 1,595 points and became the first player in USI history to score 600 points in two consecutive seasons. Freeland is an elementary education major at USI.

Gouard in three seasons has led the Eagles to an 82-12 (.872) overall record, a Great Lakes Valley Conference record of 49-7 (.875), an NCAA Division II National Championship (1995), an NCAA Division II Finalist appearance (1994), three appearances in the NCAA Division II Tournament, and two GLVC titles (1994 and 1996).

Gouard finishes his career at USI after being named NCAA Division II Player of the

The exhibition "The Indiana Decade, 1814-1824: Music, Architecture, and Culture of the Harmony Society," will continue through November 4 at the Scholle House, highlighting the rich cultural life of the Harmonists during their Indiana residency. The exhibit was organized by the New Harmony State Historic Site.

"Beads, Brackets, and Bargeboards: New Harmony's Architecture, 1840-1940," continuing through June 15 at the Owen Block Building, will examine the town's built environment from the Victorian period until World War II.

New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art will present "Evans Woollen -- Selected Works, 1963-1995," a retrospective of one of Indiana's premier architects, through May 15. Mr. Woollen currently is working on the Harmonist Granary project.
