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**AIDS AWARENESS DAYS.** A two-day program of discussion, workshops, and displays designed to promote understanding and awareness of AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) will be presented Thursday and Friday, October 1-2, at the University Center for students, staff, and the public. The program was organized by **Mrs. Sandra Lawrence**, director of Health Services, in response to diminishing participation in campus blood drives and a growing concern found in the University community. October has been designated "AIDS Education and Prevention Month" by the Center for Disease Control's National AIDS Education and Information Program and **Mayor Frank McDonald II** has been asked to proclaim October 1-2 as "AIDS Awareness Days" in Evansville, recognizing the USI program. It will feature a mock "Phil Donahue Show" at 1 p.m. on Thursday. **Ms. Sylvia Groeninger**, a USI graduate and service representative for the Evansville Chapter, American Red Cross, will be the moderator. Panelists will be **Dr. Jayne Hollander**, Louisville pathologist and regional Red Cross blood services medical director; **Mr. Larry Rowland**, staff therapist at the Southwestern Indiana Mental Health Center and a member of the local AIDS Resource Group; **Ms. Kathy Sarris**, president of Justice, Inc., an Indianapolis-based gay rights organization; and **Father Tony Kissel**, director of the USI Campus Ministry. A question-and-answer session will follow.

The Friday program will open with a presentation by **Dr. Marlene Shaw**, associate professor of biology, on "The AIDS Virus: A Search for Solution" at 8:30 a.m. **Ms. Donna Bratt**, nurse epidemiologist at Welborn Hospital, will speak on "AIDS and the Health Care Worker" at 9:30; Father Kissel will speak on "Safe Sex is Not Enough: the AIDS Epidemic and Western Religious Values" at 10:45, and Ms. Sarris will speak on "Human Rights, Homosexuality, and AIDS" at 11:45. There will be concurrent workshops at 1:30 p.m. on "Dealing with Feelings About AIDS," led by Mr. Rowland, and "AIDS Update for Health Care Workers and Emergency and Law-Enforcement Personnel," led by **Ms. Martha Deardorff**, chief nurse consultant with the Indiana State Board of Health. Also participating in the two-day program will be the USI Activities Programming Board, Deaconess Hospital Care Unit, St. Mary's Medical Center, Evansville-Vanderburgh Health Department, and the University of Evansville. Several groups will sponsor AIDS information displays, while a video tape will be aired on the campus closed-circuit system and be made available later to student groups.

Registration fees for the program are \$5 per day (lunch not included); reservations should be made by Tuesday, September 29, with the AIDS Resource Group, P.O. Box 3898, Evansville, IN 47737. The fees will cover the cost of the program, with any excess funds to be donated to the resource group. For information, call the USI Office of Student Affairs, extension 1757.

**EVANSVILLE JEFFERSON MEETING ON THE CONSTITUTION.** The Evansville Jefferson Meeting on the Constitution will be held Saturday, September 19, in the University Center. It is co-sponsored by USI and the Evansville Bar Association as a commemoration of the bicentennial of the U. S. Constitution and has been underwritten in part by a grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The convention is based on a model proposed by the Jefferson Foundation of Washington, D. C., a non-profit organization established to promote informed, rational discussion of the fundamentals of the American system of government and to facilitate public understanding of how the Constitution was made. The meetings simulate the constitutional convention process, fostering debate on substantive issues while providing insights into the opportunities and dangers inherent in constitutional change. The mock convention will include a morning session in which delegates will discuss proposed Constitutional changes and prepare presentations for the plenary session which begins at 1 p.m. Each delegate will have an opportunity to participate in the plenary session. The issues -- from which two or three will be selected for debate -- include: constitutional amendment, term of office for federal judges, the presidential veto, direct election of the president, length of term for U. S. representatives, and limiting the president to one term. Discussion group leaders for the morning session will be **Dr. Donald E. Pitzer**, USI professor of history; **Dr. David Gugin**, UE professor of political science; and **Mr. Terry Noffsinger**, Evansville attorney. **Dr. Darrel Bigham**, USI professor of history is coordinator for the mock convention and is being assisted by the Office of Continuing Education.

**NAMES IN THE NEWS.** **Dr. Charles T. Barber**, USI professor of political science, participated Saturday, September 12, in a meeting at IU/PU-Indianapolis that established the Indiana Council on U.S.-Arab Relations. In a follow-up to a March tour of the Mideast, the Indiana group has established a non-profit campus and community-oriented central office, which will serve as an information and education clearinghouse to provide a speakers bureau and to sponsor conferences, workshops, and other Mideast tours. The group's future plan is to establish an Indiana Model League of Nations.

**Dr. Darrel Bigham**, professor of history, participated in a September 10 conference in Indianapolis on "Indiana's Documentary Heritage," sponsored by the Indiana Advisory Board of the National Historical Records and Publications Commission. The conference examined present and future status of private, local and state government, and state-level records. Dr. Bigham was a member of the state government records panel.

**Dr. Charles Petranek** has been awarded a grant to be a fellow at the East-West Center, University of Hawaii in Honolulu, during his winter sabbatical leave. He will involve the Center's 90 graduate students in six social simulations that will emphasize various cultural ways of solving problems in the Pacific region. He also will conduct research on hospice care givers.

**Dr. Daniel C. Scavone**, professor of history, will present programs on Wednesdays, September 23 and October 21, at the Henderson (Kentucky) Library, sponsored by the library and the Kentucky Humanities Council. The first will be on the book, In Search of Ancient Troy, a slide presentation on the ancient history of Troy and the relationship to Homer's Iliad. The second will discuss the book itself. Both will be at 7 p.m. and are free and open to the public.

**Dr. Donald S. Wolfe**, assistant professor of German, has been notified that his article, "A True Exchange: New Opportunities for American and German Business Students," will be published as a chapter in the volume, Professional Development in International Education.

**HUMANITIES FORUM.** **Dr. James R. Blevins**, chairman of the Division of Humanities, will present the next Humanities Forum, a lecture on Arthur Miller's "All My Sons" at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, September 22, in Forum II. It is free and open to the public. The

play, Miller's first major dramatic success, is as powerful and relevant today as when it was awarded the Drama Critics' Circle Award in 1942. "All My Sons" will be one of three classics presented by USI Theatre during this academic year. Miller's play will be featured in mid-October. Dr. Blevins will be the guest director.

**FACULTY AND THE MARKETPLACE.** Dr. Howard E. Dunn, professor of chemistry, has been appointed by the Faculty Council to chair a committee to look into establishing University policy to aid the faculty in the transfer of research or writing results to the marketplace. The policy, if established, could have far-reaching effects on the University. Dr. Dunn (extensions 1715 or 1701) is seeking volunteers to serve on this important committee, which will consider the following topics:

- What effect will industrially-sponsored research have on the ability to discuss and publish your findings?
- What effect will it have on the amount of basic vs. applied research carried out at the University?
- How will licensing fees, etc., be shared between the inventor and the University?
- Will royalties from books be shared with the University?
- If more time is spent on research (making money), what effect will this have on classroom instruction?
- Will the research being done be of such a nature that the student will have a good learning experience, or will it be rather mundane routine work with very little thought involved?
- Do we need a policy?
- Will our best inventors and perhaps our best teachers leave the classroom for more lucrative ventures?

**IAC FELLOWSHIP EXHIBITION AT NEW HARMONY.** The New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, recognized as a statewide leader in the promotion of Midwest artists, is presenting an exhibition of the 1987 Indiana Arts Commission Fellowship Recipients through Wednesday, September 30. The commission granted 18 Master Fellowships and six Associate Fellowships, with stipends of \$3,000 and \$1,000, respectively. Master designates an artist working in a professional capacity for more than three years; associate stipulates that an artist has not been out of school and working as a professional for more than three years. The first exhibition of its kind outside of Indianapolis, the 1987 Fellowship Show features one work by each artist, covering the spectrum of visual arts. The New Harmony Gallery's programs are free and open to public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday. The Indiana Arts Commission is a not-for-profit state agency funded to support all the arts in Indiana. The New Harmony Gallery is funded in part by the commission as well as the National Endowment for the Arts.

**ACS GRANT.** Dr. Marie Hankins, assistant professor of chemistry, reports the USI chapter of the American Chemical Society has been awarded a \$200 grant from the national ACS to take chemical demonstrations to area high school students. The USI chapter was one of 17 in the nation to receive a grant. Dr. Hankins and Dr. Howard E. Dunn, professor of chemistry, are faculty advisors for the student group.

**LIBRARY UPDATE.** Last April, all University employees were asked to bring their USI ID to the Library to be "linked" to their record via a barcode. This was in preparation for easier checkout of books from the general collection. Many of you complied; some even used the automated system this past summer. With full implementation this fall, the system will generate automatic overdue notices. The second and final notice is a "bill for replacement" (BFR), plus a \$3 processing fee. Once this stage is reached, there is no refunding of the \$3. Please be prompt on returning all items to avoid overdue notices and processing fees.

**UNIVERSITY NOTES DEADLINES.** Items must be submitted to University Relations in the President's Office by noon Monday (the Friday before if Monday is a holiday) for inclusion in the weekly University Notes distributed on Wednesday. A monthly calendar is included on the last Wednesday prior to the start of a new month; the deadline for calendar listings is the Friday prior to the last Wednesday of each month.

**AFFIRMATIVE ACTION.** The Affirmative Action Plan for the University of Southern Indiana outlines the University's commitment to the principles of nondiscrimination and its assurance of compliance with national, state, and local civil rights legislation and enactments. The University reaffirms its present policy of nondiscrimination and equal employment opportunity with respect to recruitment, hiring, training, promotion, and programs under the legal control of the University Trustees which shall be maintained on a nondiscriminatory basis in regard to race, sex, religion, handicap, age, or national origin at all times. Included in the plan are guidelines for disabled veterans, veterans of the Vietnam era, and handicapped persons. Also outlined are the guidelines on sexual harrasment, acting appointments, and the procedures to follow in filling open positions. The University will continue to take positive actions to ensure against discrimination directed to all persons. All members of the faculty and staff are expected to give full support to the University's commitment to equal opportunity and affirmative action.
