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REPRESENTATIVE CHISHOLM ON CAMPUS. Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm (D-NY) will keynote the first session of the Women in Government program on Friday, February 3 at 7:30 p.m. The program is open to the public and free of charge. Congresswoman Chisholm, who represents the 12th Congressional District of New York, is a specialist in early childhood education and child welfare who entered politics in 1964 when she ran successfully for the New York State Assembly on the Democratic ticket. She first ran for Congress in 1968, campaigning under the slogan "Unbought and Unbossed."

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In 1972, Chisholm declared her candidacy for President of the United States and went on to become the first woman from a major political party to carry her candidacy through to its conclusion at the 1972 Democratic National Convention, where she received 152 delegate votes.

In addition to Chisholm, other participants in the program February 3 are QUENTIN DAVIS, Assistant Professor of Political Science who will give a national overview of the history of women in government, and DR. DARREL BIGHAM, Associate Professor of History, who will give a local overview of the history of women in government.

Following the keynote address, there will be a panel discussion of the issues by Shirley Cox, Vanderburgh County Clerk; Betty Lou Jarboe, Evansville City Councilwoman; Estella Moss, Vanderburgh County Recorder; and Nancy Worden, Evansville City Clerk.

A reactor panel will be composed of Norma Kacen, Executive Director of the Evansville Teacher's Association; Sondra Matthews, President of the Inner-City Neighborhood Planning Council; Barbara McKenna, Past President of the League of Women Voters; and Susie Nicholson, Past President of Leadership Evansville.

An open reception, sponsored by Delta Sigma Theta, will follow the program. The program is sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education and is co-sponsored by the Vanderburgh County Democrat and Republican women's organizations and the League of Women Voters of Southwestern Indiana. It is funded, in part, by the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The second segment of Women in Government will be held Thursday, February 9.
