USI Board of Trustees approve budget request for next two years

The University of Southern Indiana Board of Trustees approved the 1999-2001 biennial operating budget request at its September 3 meeting. The budget request of \$47.4 million in 1999-2000 and \$50.5 million in 2000-01, to be funded from state appropriations and student fees, will be used to maintain the current educational programs and to provide new funding for several quality improvement initiatives. It also includes funding adjustments for the large enrollment increases attained by the University during the past two years. In addition, the capital budget request includes funding for a \$21.6 million science/education classroom building.

The quality improvement initiatives primarily address critical technology needs. Richard Schmidt, vice president for Business Affairs, said, "Technology pervades every aspect of the educational enterprise, presenting exciting new ways to enhance learning. The challenges of technology and the shifting emphasis on how technology is used places heavy demands on University resources."

Funding will improve recruitment, retention, and training of information technology professionals. Other technology improvement needs to be funded are replacement of the library's operating system, expansion of workforce programming and laboratory upgrades, student retention, and partnerships with K-12 schools in rural communities. Over \$1.2 million is requested for the first year and \$1.4 for the second year.

The enrollment equity adjustment is \$3.2 million for the first year only.

The budget request includes bonding authorization and fee replacement for a science/education classroom building. The building will provide essential classrooms and specialized instructional facilities needed due to increased student enrollment and program expansion in science and education. The projected cost of the facility is \$21.6 million.

Following board approval, the budget will be reviewed by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education and the State Budget Agency before being presented to the Indiana legislature next year.

In other matters, USI President H. Ray Hoops announced another record enrollment this fall. Early figures show enrollment just over 8,400 students, exceeding last fall's record by 100. Seventy-one percent of the students enrolled are full-time students.

Eighty-nine Indiana counties are represented in the count. About 2,500 students continue an increasing trend of living in campus housing. Next fall two new freshman residences will open to meet the demand for housing. Each will accommodate 180 students.

Harolyn Torain, the chair of the Board of Trustees, announced the board had conducted the formal presidential assessment of President Hoops and his contract will be extended to 2004.

Six people will be recognized for 25 years of service to the University of Southern Indiana during the seventh annual Founders Day program at 3:30 p.m. on Tuesday, September 15, in Carter Hall. The six employees who reach the quarter-century mark this year are: Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology; Ms. Ruth N. Hahn, Access Services librarian; Dr. Robert E. Mays, associate dean of the School of Education and Human Services; Dr. Charles Petranek, professor of sociology; Dr. Marlene V. Shaw, professor of biology; and Mr. Gary White, medical research technician.

Names in the News


Ms. Deborah L. Carl, program director of dental hygiene, was elected vice-chair of the National Dental Hygiene Directors of the American Association of Dental Schools at the annual meeting of directors in June. She will serve as vice-chair in 1998, chair-elect in 1999, and chair in 2000.

Ms. Carol MacKay, associate professor of French and chair of the Foreign Language Department, gave the presentation "Teaching the French Enlightenment as an Interdisciplinary Course" on July 23 at the national meeting of the American Association of Teachers of French national meeting in Montreal, Quebec.

Additional department changes:

Dr. Ernest Hall Jr., associate professor of management, is chair of the management and marketing department. He received the Ph.D. from the University of Mississippi and has been at USI since 1992.

Dr. Marwan Wafa, professor of decision sciences, is associate dean of the School of Business and director of the Master of Business Administration Program. He received the Ph.D. from Clemson University and has been at USI since 1986.



Dr. Robert Gehring earned a B.A. from Yale University and the Ph.D. from University of Colorado. Before coming to USI, he was a U.S. Army Personnel Psychology Specialist in mental testing and had taught at the University of Hawaii and the University of Colorado.

He began his career at USI as assistant professor of psychology, soon becoming an associate professor. Dr. Gehring's publications and presentations include such topics as studies in memory retention in adults and children, visual memory retention, and children's recall of commercials.

The State of Indiana Corporation for Science and Technology and RCA funded his collaborative project to develop and test a home-video literacy program in 1987. Since 1989, Dr. Gehring's research has included several projects for the American Society for Engineering Education and the U.S. Navy.

In 1994, he hosted his first European tour for USI students in Italy.


Ms. Ruth Hahn earned a B.S. from Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro and an M.L.S. from Indiana University in Bloomington. Before coming to USI, she was assistant librarian at Rule High School in Knoxville, Tennessee, and librarian at Warioto Region Library in Clarksville, Tennessee, where she did cataloging for the region and served as bookmobile librarian for two counties. In 1973, Ms. Hahn accepted a reader services librarian position at USI and was responsible for checkout, serials, and interlibrary loans. In 1976, she assumed the responsibility of the Learning Resources Center when Media Services was reassigned to Library Services.

Between 1975 and 1987 Ms. Hahn helped advise students who had not declared a major area of study. "This is one hat that I miss," she said. In 1979, Ms. Hahn added the responsibility of reference supervisor when the library added a library assistant support staff position.

When the Indiana libraries began working toward automation in 1980, Ms. Hahn served on the state's task force committee developing functional specifications for a statewide automated system. USI's first automated circulation system (GEAC) was implemented in spring 1987. "We still used the card catalog until our second system (NOTIS) was installed in 1990", said Ms. Hahn, "NOTIS was a fully integrated system that included acquisitions, cataloging, and circulation. Now our third system (Voyager), has Internet links for related material."

Ms. Hahn was appointed acting assistant director from July 1996 to November 1997. Her title changed to Access Services librarian in 1998.

"One advantage of working in a library with a small staff is that if you are at a standstill in one project, you can always put on a different hat and work on another project. You don't have to worry about not having enough to do," Ms. Hahn said.



A native of Evansville, **Dr. Robert E. Mays** earned a B.S. in elementary education from University of Alaska and an M.S. and the Ed.D. from Indiana University. He taught for the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation (EVSC) and at the Culver Military Academy. In 1973, Dr. Mays joined the USI faculty as director of student teaching. He was chair of the Department of Teacher Education from 1988 to 1991. Dr. Mays has been associate dean and director of field experiences since 1991.

Besides serving as a consultant to school corporations and national education committees throughout the U.S., Dr. Mays has also served on the Board of Directors and on the Corporate Board of the Evansville Association for Retarded Citizens, Head Start, and the Southwestern Indiana Mental Health Center, Inc. and chaired the Tri-County Educational Task Force for the Administration for Children, Youth, and Families.

In 1981, Dr. Mays was selected by Indiana Governor Robert D. Orr's Office to serve as a "Conference Evaluator" for the Governor's White House Conference on Children and Youth. He was presented North Central's (Kappa) Distinguished Achievement Award for Professional Excellence and Outstanding Service in April of 1984. That same year Mays was one of six persons selected from throughout the state of Indiana by the Indiana Department of Education to evaluate the statewide Prime Time Project and make recommendations to State Superintendent Harold Negley and Indiana Governor Robert Orr. Dr. Mays has served since 1987 on a review panel for special programs which include Upward Bound, Talent Search, Educational Opportunity Centers, Trio Programs, and Special Services for Disadvantaged Students. He was selected for this post by the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Post Secondary Education, U.S. Department of Education. In 1988, Dr. Mays was selected by the Indiana Department of Education to serve on an accreditation team to evaluate teacher education programs. That same year, he was selected by the Indiana Department of Mental Health and Education to serve on the Higher Education Council for Early Intervention. The University of Southern Indiana Alumni Association selected Dr. Mays to receive the all-university Faculty Recognition Award in 1995. Also in 1995, the Indiana Black Expo presented Dr. Mays with its Outstanding Achievement Certificate for notable accomplishments and contributions in the field of education.

Reflecting on his experiences at USI, Mays states, "This has been an exciting 25 years, chairing the various accreditation committees and seeing the many education programs added to the curriculum, and knowing that you've played a major part in that happening."

He and his wife Martharee have one son Korbin.

A native of Wakefield, Michigan, **Dr. Charles Petranek** earned a B.A. in sociology, psychology, and philosophy from Aquinas College; an M.A. in sociology from Western Michigan University; and the Ph.D. in sociology from Florida State University. He taught at Cleveland State University for three years, then joined the USI faculty in 1973. Dr. Petranek was chair of the sociology department from 1985 to 1998. In 1995, he was selected by his colleagues to receive the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award at Commencement. In 1997, he

was honored by the USI Student Government Association with the Spirit of the Eagle Award for Faculty.

While teaching in Cleveland, Dr. Petranek and his wife Diana sought to settle in a smaller city. He chose the Upper Peninsula in Michigan and Diana chose a city in Florida. They compromised and moved to Evansville, Indiana, and Dr. Petranek calls it "a successful compromise."

Throughout his career, Dr. Petranek has directed evaluative research for numerous community organizations including such topics as priorities for the United Way, child/youth needs, analyses on child abuse/neglect, and client assessments of mental health facilities. His publications in professional journals center on his work with the techniques of simulation and debriefing and reflect his involvement with hospice care on local, state, and national levels. Dr. Petranek and his wife Diana authored the book *Inside Marriage: You, Me and Us* and own Petranek Consulting Services, Inc., which conducts large-scale research projects on evaluation and needs assessment.

A past-president of Indiana Association of Hospices, his hospice research in Evansville led to the founding of the local Ohio Valley Hospice of which he was president for six years.

Dr. Petranek said that the University has been very good to him and his family. He especially appreciates USI's emphasis on teaching which has allowed him to implement creative teaching methods. He also noted that during the 1970s, private schools in the U.S. were in financial trouble and were downsizing. In contrast, USI was expanding and has been constantly growing, and that growth has led to good things on campus and in the community.

He and Diana have three children, Scott, Ann-Marie, and Karen; and two grandchildren.

Dr. Marlene Shaw earned a B.A. from Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio; and an M.S. and the Ph.D. from the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana. Before coming to USI as assistant professor of biology, she was a postdoctoral research associate in biochemistry at the University of Michigan.

Early in her USI career, Dr. Shaw took students to professional meetings, and on tours of graduate schools and pharmaceutical companies. She twice chaired the Economics Benefit Committee and the Faculty Academic Affairs Committee, and thrice chaired the Faculty Senate as well as participating on several other University committees. The 1991 USI Distinguished Professor, Dr. Shaw considers these projects all "time well spent for myself and my students." In recent years, she focuses more on undergraduate research students and improving teaching in that area.

Dr. Shaw was project director for two National Science Foundation grants to purchase molecular biology equipment for updating teaching laboratories.


From 1981 to 1983, Dr. Shaw directed the development and construction of a fifteen-part exhibit developed for the Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences titled "DNA: The Blueprint of Life". She also developed and established a distinguished lecture series titled "Biology-at-the-Interface" which focused on how biology intersects with other disciplines. Dr. Shaw said that, "bringing nationally recognized speakers to campus enhances the academic environment of the University for students, faculty, and the community. I hope there is increased support in that area."

Since 1993, she has been working on a collaborative research project with Dr. Joey Barnett '81 at Vanderbilt University studying the development of the cardiovascular system. Twelve USI students worked with her in this effort. For this project, she and her students received Student/Faculty Research and Creative Work awards and Indiana Academy of Science grants.

While Dr. Shaw served as chair of the faculty and staff division of *Campaign USI*, the campaign raised over \$1 million dollars in contributions, pledges, and deferred gifts in that division.

"I am grateful to the University for supporting professional development opportunities. I work in a field where information is exploding and staying current with that information is a major factor in the excitement I feel about my teaching. Because of the University's support, I have participated in some high quality workshops and short courses."

Gary W. White, a 1973 USI graduate, accepted a position with the Indiana University School of Medicine Evansville Center the year he graduated. His office was on the University of Evansville campus when the Evansville Center had classroom space there. He moved to the third level of the Health Professions Center on the USI campus in 1995 when that building opened. Active in research work with Evansville Center faculty, Mr. White has seen technology change in his career. He operated key punch before desktop computers were introduced. When the desktop computers arrived, he helped interface with equipment in the lab.

His first college classes in 1969 were in the newly-opened Science Center of USI where he took a class from Dr. Ruthann Sturtevant, a member of the science faculty who later joined the IU School of Medicine Evansville Center. When he was interviewing for a position after receiving his degree, he was interviewed by Dr. Sturtevant who hired him for the center. He and his wife Mary have three teenage children, Amy, 16 and twin sons, Brandon and Jason, 14.

Archaeological exhibit will feature recent discoveries

An exhibit of recent archeological discoveries in Posey County will open on Monday, September 14 during Indiana Archaeology Week. The new exhibit will showcase excavations conducted in 1996 and 1997 at the Hovey Lake village site, a late Mississippian Indian site dating from A.D. 1400-1700. Archaeological investigations were conducted by Cheryl Ann Munson, research archaeologist at Indiana University, assisted by Marjorie Jones, USI instructor in anthropology, along with USI archaeology students.

Munson will give an illustrated public lecture, "New Clues, Ancient Patterns: recent archaeological excavations and surveys at the Hovey Lake and Murphy Sites, Posey County," at 7 p.m. on Thursday, September 17 at the Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon.

A non-technical summary of what was learned about the Hovey Lake village site, the people who lived there, and their culture is available in a booklet, "Archaeology at the Hovey Lake Village Site." The booklet, published by Historic Southern Indiana, the University of Southern Indiana, and the USI Foundation, with partial funding from the Indiana Arts Commission, will be available for a \$2 donation at the Visitor's Center.

The authors of the booklet, Munson, Jones, Besse LaBudde, Jocelyn Turner, and artist William Melvin will meet the public at the Hovey Lake Visitor's Center from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, September 19.

New at the Gallery

The New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art will feature exhibitions by Ms. Jane Calvin and Mr. Tony Wright from Tuesday, September 15 to Wednesday, October 28. A public opening reception will be held from 5 p.m. - 7 p.m. on Saturday, September 12.

Ms. Calvin is a Chicago-based photographer and the recipient of numerous awards and grants. She earned an MFA from the School of Art Institute of Chicago. Ms. Calvin exhibits nationally and internationally and her work is in numerous collections including the Art Institute of Chicago, Minneapolis Institute of Art and Detroit Institute of Art.

Ms. Calvin's color photographs are made by photographing staged room-size assemblages that are meticulously made up of various types of found objects and projected images.

A resident of Carbondale, Illinois, Mr. Wright is a potter and instructor of intermediate and advanced ceramics at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. In addition to teaching, he has worked as a freelance artist, carpenter and scenic artist for several years.

While Mr. Wright creates pots utilitarian in nature, they are admired for their pristine aesthetic value. In his work, he strives to unify the unique forms and surfaces of his vessels by using glazes that are extremely subtle in color and surface quality. This results in functional objects of extraordinary beauty and timeless elegance.
