MATTHEW GRAHAM TO GIVE POETRY READING. Assistant professor of English Matthew Graham will present a poetry reading Monday, October 8 at 1:00 p.m. in the University Center, Rooms 351 and 352. Born in 1954 in the Catskills, he received graduate degrees from the John Hopkins University and the Iowa Writer's Workshop. His writing awards include the Academy of American Poets Award in 1981, a Pushcart Prize in 1982, and a Breadloaf Scholarship in 1983. His work has appeared in many small magazines, including The Antioch Review. Kansas Quarterly, and The Missouri Review. His first book of poems, New World Architecture, is forthcoming this spring from the Galileo Press in Baltimore.

Graham is assistant professor of English and head of the creative writing program at ISUE. Everyone is cordially invited to attend this opening presentation of the Humanities Forum 1984-85.

Jeff Hays, purchasing agent at ISUE, has been honored by the Indiana Association of Cities and Towns for his role in helping pass legislation to allow municipalities and counties to adopt a local income tax. The Board of Directors of the American Society of Civil Engineers has appointed Augustine J. Fredrich, chairman of the Engineering Technology Division, to the Society's National Water Policy Committee. As a member of this seven-member committee, Mr. Fredrich will assist in the preparation of policy papers reflecting the views of more than 90,000 civil engineers on the nation's water resources policies and programs. The committee also is responsible for preparing advisory information for the U.S. Congress and the Executive Office of the President on civil engineering aspects of water resources issues such as dam safety inspections, protection of groundwater resources, and wastewater treatment.

Professor Fredrich has served for eight years as a member of the Executive Committee of the Society's Water Resources Planning and Management Division. He also is a member of the Board of Directors of the Evansville Port Authority and the Evansville Environmental Protection Advisory Board.
