EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

College students and professors who want summer jobs can get the latest information from the new 1973 edition of the annual "Summer Employment Directory of the United States" and the "1973 Directory of Overseas Summer Jobs" just received by the Office of Career Placement.

In the U.S. Directory, employers list more than 90,000 summer job openings at resorts, summer camps, national parks, summer theatres, ranches and restaurants. Applications are invited now. Summer jobs will be more plentiful in 1973 than last year in South Atlantic states, Michigan and Oregon, but less plentiful in the Midwest, Main and New York. Salaries generally are about the same, with some increases; many jobs include room and board, other benefits such as laundry, travel allowance, end-of-season bonus.

The "1973 Directory of Overseas Summer Jobs" was prepared in Britain for American students and teachers who want to work abroad this summer.

The annual edition contains 50,000 specific vacancies in more than 30 foreign countries, including England, Scotland, Wales, Norway, Netherlands, Belgium, France, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Yugoslavia, Greece, Israel. Details and visa regulations are given.

CHANGE IN SOCIAL SECURITY RATES

Starting on January 1, 1973, the Federal Social Security Act requires an increase in your tax deduction of 5.85% of your earnings up to \$10,800 for the year. These funds provide you with current life and disability insurance protection as well as a monthly pension when you retire.

In addition to matching your own Social Security contribution dollar for dollar, the University will continue to pay its share of the other benefits you now receive.

The present law provides for an increase in the salary base to \$12,000 beginning January 1, 1974, with the rate to remain at 5.85% in 1974.
