FORMER USI PROFESSOR TO JUDGE STUDENT ART SHOW. Mr. Dan Engelke, who was instrumental in the 1970's in establishing ceramic and design programs for the USI Art Department, will be the judge for the 1989 Student Art Exhibition, April 23-30. Mr. Engelke, who was with USI for seven years, now is an associate professor of art at Purdue University. His work has won numerous regional and national honors. He has created installation sculptures since 1973, with his most ambitious project being "Lightpath," installed in 1987 in Lake Michigan, jutting from the Indiana Dunes State Park beach. Engelke will lecture on his work and the Student Art Exhibition at 6 p.m. Thursday, April 20, in Room 109 of the Technology Center. At 10 a.m. Friday, April 21, he will present a video-illustrated lecture on the Lake Michigan sculpture, also in TC109. Both programs are open to the public.

The Student Art Exhibition will be set up in the University Conference Center. It will open with a public reception from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, April 23; the awards ceremony will be at 2 p.m. The exhibition will continue on public display through April 30.

NOTED ASTRONOMER TO LECTURE AT USI. An astronomer who is closely associated with the National Aeronautic and Space Administration (NASA) "Large Space Telescope Project" will be a guest lecturer on Thursday, April 13, at USI and at Angel Mounds State Historic Site. Dr. Laurence W. Fredrick will speak on "The Measurement of Cosmic Distances" at 2 p.m. in SC254, discussing the purpose of the soon-to-be-launched telescope that is expected to confirm many of the theories about the size and age of our Universe. A reception will follow in the University Center Dining Room. The School of Science and Engineering Technology Community of Scholars lecture is open to the public, as well as all USI students and faculty and staff members. Dr. Fredrick also will lecture at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Angel Mounds Interpretive Center on "Ancient Monuments and the Game of Checkers," a discussion of Stone Age astronomy.

SEXUAL ASSAULT TRAUMA SEMINAR. Coping with the physical and emotional stress that follows sexual assault will be explored in a seminar at 8 a.m. Friday, April 14, in the University Center. Featured speakers in the School of Nursing and Health Professions Community of Scholars program will be Dr. Peg Ziegler, administrator and counselor/clinician for the Grady Memorial Hospital Rape Crisis Center in Georgia, and Vanderburgh County Prosecutor Robert J. Pigman. The program is designed to provide criminal justice, health care, and human services professionals, students, and other interested persons with the latest information on the impact of assault on victims and families; effective medical and psychological treatment; successful detection, investigation, and prosecution; and sexual assault prevention. NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Charles T. Barber, chairman of the Department of Philosophy and Political Science, participated in the 30th annual convention of the International Studies Association March 28-April 3 at the University of London, England. He presented a paper, "Middle East Development: A Focus on the Gulf States," for a panel on "Third World Development: A Cross-Regional Comparison" and also participated in the International Studies Notes Board of Editors meeting.

Dr. Sherry Boyd, assistant professor of education, Dr. Jane A. Davis-Brezette, chairperson of the Department of Education, and Dr. Robert E. Mays, chairperson of the Department of Teacher Education, recently served on the Head Start Tri-County Assessment Team, evaluating programs in Gibson, Posey, and Vanderburgh counties. Dr. Mays chaired the evaluation team.

Dr. Aldo F. Cardarelli, professor of education, presented a paper, "An Enhanced Cloze Procedure To Increase Comprehension in Elementary and Middle School Readers," at the Indiana State Reading Conference in Indianapolis.

Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, was senior author of a paper presented April 2 to the Eastern Psychological Association in Boston. The paper, "Recall with One vs. Two Verbal Codes," discussed a study indicating how using a chalkboard in college teaching can double student retention and concluding that the most effective teaching procedure combines verbal input, pictorial illustration, and printing key terms on the board.

Dr. M. Edward Jones, associate vice president for Academic Affairs and director of Extended Services, was moderator for a panel on general manufacturing at the "New Era of Trade for Indiana" conference March 31 in Indianapolis. The conference was sponsored by the five state baccalaureate-granting universities and the Corporation for Indiana's International Future. Dr. Walter W. Jermakowicz, associate professor of business, and Mr. Timothy B. Mahoney, coordinator of the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum, also attended the conference.
