## COMMUNITY TRIBUTE TO HONOR DAVID AND BETTY RICE

A community-wide tribute is planned to honor USI President David L. Rice and Mrs. Betty Rice for their 27 years of community and educational leadership.

The Tribute to David and Betty Rice, to be held Wednesday evening, March 2, in Vanderburgh Auditorium Gold Room, was announced by Mr. Donald B. Cox, long-time USI Foundation Board member who has worked on many projects with the Rices. Mr. Cox said the entire community owes a debt to the Rices "for giving the southern Indiana community more than a quarter-century of their extraordinary leadership. David and Betty Rice not only deserve credit for development of a fine public university, but also for serving many organizations here, particularly those which touch young lives."

Invitations to the dinner will go out February 8. Reserved tables of eight will be \$350 per table or \$43.75 per person. Open seating also will be available at \$35 per person. The ticket price will include a 6 p.m. cocktail reception and 7 p.m. dinner and program. Dignitaries from throughout the region and state are expected to participate. Call the University Relations Office, extension 1755, for ticket information.

President Rice will retire from USI's presidency at the end of June after serving as founding president. He brought his family to Evansville in 1967, two years after the Evansville campus of Indiana State University was founded. The first administrative head of the campus, he developed the curriculum from limited

Dr. Bigham is chair of the Steering Committee on Religious History in the Schools
