DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR LECTURE TODAY. Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, will deliver the Distinguished Professor Lecture at 3 p.m. today in Forum One of the Administration Building. All members of the University community and the public are invited to attend.

ISUE ARTISTS WIN IN MID-STATES EXHIBIT. ISUE Professor of Art John W. McNaughton and a student and former student — Don Ledbetter of Evansville and Kevin Irvin of Ft. Branch — won three of four purchase awards announced Saturday night for the 1985 Mid-States Craft Exhibition. McNaughton won the \$500 Jeanne Bowman Ellenstein Purchase Award with his wood piece, "It's Greek to Me;" Ledbetter won the \$500 George S. Olive & Co. Purchase Award with his formica table titled "Random Scrap," and Irvin won the \$500 Rossanna McGinnis Enlow Memorial Purchase Award with his wood and glass work, "Grandma's Roses."

The 25th annual Mid-States Exhibit opened Saturday night and will be on display in the Main Gallery at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences through March 31.

HONOR SYMPOSIUM ON CREATIVITY HELD AT ISUE. Nearly 40 ISUE students participated in the first Honor Student Symposium held last Saturday, February 23 in the University Center. The symposium was designed to acknowledge the students' academic achievements and to stimulate them to greater accomplishments in the future. The students selected for participation in the symposium were nominated by faculty members who were impressed with the students' abilities and achievements. During the all-day program, the topic of creativity was explored from the perspectives of faculty members on the program. Dr. Howard E. Dunn, professor of chemistry, discussed "Creative Thought and Invention;" Mr. John W. McNaughton, professor of art, spoke on "The Artist's Mind;" Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, chose the topic, "Creativity and Utopia," and Dr. Joseph J. Palladino, assistant professor of psychology, discussed "Creativity: Measurement and Personality Correlates." The symposium was designed and implemented by the faculty on the program, working with the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. It was made possible by a grant from the ISUE Foundation. Organizers hope future symposia with a variety of topics can be possible for honor students.

ISUE TO BE HOST FOR SPECIAL OLYMPICS. Area 13 Special Olympics and ISUE will sponsor the 1985 Indiana Special Olympics Basketball Sectional Tournament Saturday, March 2, with 23 Southwestern Indiana teams expected to participate in the single-elimination tournament in the University's PAC. Mike Blake, sports director of WFIE-TV, will be master of ceremonies for the opening ceremony at 8:45 a.m. Special guests will be ISUE President Dr. David L. Rice, the Evansville Thunder basketball team, and Thunder Man. Special Olympics teams will compete at 9, 10:15 and 11:30 a.m. and 12:45 p.m. on the three separate courts.

HUMANITIES FORUM TODAY. Evans Woollen, founder and primary designer for the firm of Woollen, Molzan and Partners of Indianapolis, will be featured in a Humanities Forum program, "Toward an Architecture of Process," at 2 p.m. today (February 27) in Forum Two. Woollen earned both his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Architecture from Yale University. After three years of apprenticeship with Philip Johnson & Landis Gores, he returned to his hometown of Indianapolis and established his own firm. Through his efforts the firm has received 10 design awards from the American Institute of Architects/Indiana Society of Architects and other major awards. Regional award-winning projects include: Indiana University Musical Arts Center, the New Harmony Inn and communal living quarters for St. Meinrad Abbey. Currently, Mr. Woollen serves as architect for the addition to the Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences. He will explore the application to contemporary architecture of four interrelated themes of process philosophy, which deals with an evolutionary world view and the temporal flow of experience, using fine art works and examples of his own designs as illustration.

An article by Sandra P. Barber, coordinator of the Data Processing Program at Henderson Community College, Charles T. Barber, ISUE professor of political science, and Sandra M. Singer, ISUE associate professor of psychology, was published recently in Proceedings of the 1984 ISSUE Conference -- Chicago, Illinois, 15-18 July 1984, edited by Richard L. Cook, pages 85-94. ISSUE stands for the International SPSS Software Users Exchange. The article, "Predicting Presidential Elections on College Campuses," evaluated data generated by original simulations conducted in Kentucky and Indiana.
