Teacher of the Year nominee to speak

Mr. Dan Durbin, a 1984 communications graduate who is 1996 Teacher of the Year in Indiana and one of four nominees for National Teacher of the Year, will return to campus to speak at 7 p.m. Thursday, March 21, in Mitchell Auditorium.

Mr. Durbin's topic will be "Excellence in Communication: From the Classroom to the Corporation." The program is sponsored by the USI Communications Arts Club and is open to the public. For information, contact Dr. Helen R. Sands, professor of communications, extension 1734.

Mr. Durbin graduated magna cum laude from USI. He teaches English, literature, and speech at Reitz, where he is chair of the English Department and director of forensics. Under his leadership, Reitz forensics students have been consistent champions on local, regional, and state levels, including having won USI's annual High School Speech Meet for many consecutive years.

Mr. Durbin has been elected to the Indiana Speech Hall of Fame. He is an education consultant for Excel in Chicago

Governor, Ken McCutchan to be honored

Governor Bayh to be USI Commencement speaker

Indiana Governor Evan Bayh will be the speaker for USI's 1996 Commencement, to be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 4, at Roberts Stadium. Governor Bayh and Evansville historian and long-time radio personality Mr. Kenneth P. McCutchan will be the recipients of honorary doctoral degrees.

The selection of speaker and degree recipients was approved Thursday at the March meeting of the USI Board of Trustees. The Board also adopted the preliminary listing of 973 master's, bachelor's, and associate degree candidates for the University's 26th annual ceremony. The first commencement in 1971 saw 151 students receive their degrees.

Governor Bayh is being honored for his service to the people and State of Indiana. He followed his father -- former three-term U.S. Senator Birch Bayh -- into Hoosier politics in 1986, when he was elected secretary of state. Two years later, he was elected Indiana's 46th governor and is now completing his second and final term, leading an administration that put priority on and achieved national recognition for sound fiscal management, economic growth, and education.

The Governor led the fight for investment and innovation in education. Among innovative programs are Discovery Schools, encouraging local schools to restructure themselves; 4Rs, promoting basic skills learning in primary grades through access

to technology; and 21st Century Scholars, which guarantees college tuition for low-income students who stay drug-free. There also has been emphasis on preparing Hoosier students for the challenges of global competition and the Step Ahead program, promoting pre-school attention ranging from pre-natal to day care.

Preliminary approvals given for new construction

The groundwork was laid Thursday for nearly \$20 million in construction projects at USI:

- * a \$15.2-million classroom/office building which primarily will house the School of Liberal Arts and provide state-of-the-art electronic classrooms to carry the University into the 21st century
- * \$4.3 million for four new student apartment buildings plus a general purpose building that will include office space for the housing staff
- * \$195,000 for a temporary five-classroom structure to be located behind the Science Center

Wilder Allen to be Alumnus-in-Residence

In addition to a variety of meetings and lunch with students and faculty, Mr. Allen will speak at 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. in Mitchell Auditorium on the topic, "Management Consulting: So You Want To Be Your Own Boss -- Let's Talk." The two sessions are open to the public.

Mr. Allen formerly was corporate safety director with Southern Indiana Gas and Electric Company and had been doing private consulting in his spare time for a couple of years when he decided to embark on his own business. Safety Management Corporation became reality in

Governor Bayh has worked with President Bill Clinton and top national education leaders as a member and in 1995 as chairman of the National Education Goals Panel. He also served as chairman of the Education Commission of the States and is one of the governors on the National Assessment in Education Panel.

Governor Bayh graduated with honors in business economics from Indiana University in 1978, and received his law degree from the University of Virginia in 1981. After clerking for a federal appeals court judge, he entered private law practice in Indianapolis.

Mr. McCutchan is being honored for his lifelong service to the Evansville/Vanderburgh County community and to the University. Now a resident of Solarbron Pointe Retirement Community, he spent most of his life on the historic family homesite acquired by his great-grandfather

as a land grant in 1835. McCutchan was born on and still owns 115 acres of the family tract in northern Vanderburgh County. The family history sparked his interest in community history and led to his authorship of five books — *From Then Til Now* (1969), the story of McCutchanville; *A Pictorial Study of the Old Vanderburgh County Courthouse* (1972); *Saundersville, The English Settlement* (1978); and *At the Bend of the River: The Story of Evansville* (1982). While researching the first book, he came across the legend of Isaac Knight, which he developed into a fascinating children's story published by Greenwich Book Publishers of New York.

Mr. McCutchan graduated from Evansville College in 1935. After World War II service with the Army Corps of Engineers in North Africa and Europe, he enrolled in the Sorbonne in Paris and earned a certificate in French language and culture. He returned to the U.S. and became a veteran's counselor, producing a radio show to assist service personnel in finding postwar employment. Because of that program, he was invited to help launch a new radio station, WIKY, and was the first on-air voice on August 4, 1947. He worked there for 26 years as disc jockey, in special programs, and in news.

Mr. McCutchan was the house emcee at Mesker Amphitheatre for five years, during its heyday, serving as on-stage host for many of the great musical entertainers of the '50s and '60s. He has been a public speaker, recently wrote a weekly column on area history for The Evansville Courier, and has served with the boards of local and state historical organizations.

Mr. McCutchan paints for pleasure and has collected the works of Indiana artists. Last year, he gave a portion of his collection to USI for display and use in educational programs. He also has collected the works of Indiana writers and has given half of that collection to Historic New Harmony.

New building signs

The USI Board of Trustees approved the projects at the March meeting. The plans will be submitted to state agencies for approval. Timely approvals would allow construction to begin this year on housing and in 1997 on the classroom building; occupancy of the classroom building is anticipated in fall 1999.

The Board, with support from the 1996 General Assembly, is accelerating the construction timetable to help ease the pressure from the continually growing enrollment at USI. Dr. John W. Byrd, vice president for Student Affairs, told the Board Thursday that fall 1996 enrollment applications are strong and he expects a steady three to five percent growth each year, taking USI to nearly 9,000 students by 2000. Fall 1995 enrollment was 7,666.

Construction plans call for 30 general classrooms, 22 specialized instructional facilities for individual disciplines, 80 faculty offices, and support facilities. While the primary user will be the School of Liberal Arts, space will be available for scheduling by all academic schools. The School of Liberal Arts is USI's largest academic unit, providing instruction in the core subject areas of English, speech, history, humanities, art, music, philosophy, political science, psychology, sociology, and foreign languages for the entire University curriculum.

The new classroom building will bring together widely scattered departments, such as radio and television facilities now located on opposite sides of the campus and theatre offices now in a renovated maintenance building, while students and faculty are required to travel 2 1/2 miles to the USI Theatre for classes. Electronic classrooms will be a highlight of the new building, providing the University with multimedia diversity and expanded distance education capability.

University housing now accommodates 1,500 students. Three new housing units are expected to be ready for occupancy in the fall, accommodating 192 students. The four proposed buildings would house another 256 students, while the service building/office facility would free four apartments currently used for housing offices.
