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ISUE'S STUDENT NEWSPAPER AND YEARBOOK ARE AWARD-WINNERS. On Friday, April 11 and Saturday, April 12, the Indiana Collegiate Press Association presented awards in student publication. ISUE competed in the Division II category.

ISUE's student newspaper, The Shield, captured six awards and finished fourth overall in competition against twelve schools. The Shield received four First Place awards: Best Use of Copy in an Ad(STEVE COSTELLO); Best Special Issue; Best Sports Photo(TOM LILLY); and Best Column(GEORGE SIMPSON). In addition, it took Second Place for Best Sports Story.

Six Division II schools competed in the yearbook category. ISUE's Transitions received Second Place for Best Cover and Honorable Mention for Best Academic Presentation; Best Campus Event Coverage; Best Feature and Best Coverage of Organizations.

In his forum entitled "Some Social Implications of the Romantic Nature-Lover in Literature," Sanders will consider some aspects of Romanticism in several works, most especially the novels of D.H. Lawrence.

Sanders completed his Ph.D at Cambridge University in 1971 and began teaching at IU the same year. He has published both stories and articles and is currently writing a novel about the exploration of the Ohio Valley.

His lecture will be at 12:30 p.m. in Room L103.

ISUE THEATRE DEPARTMENT PRESENTS "STORY THEATRE." On Friday and Saturday, April 18 and 19, the ISUE Theatre department will close its spring season with "Story Theatre," a presentation of works of prose fiction adapted for stage reading.

Directed by Communications and Theatre faculty DRs. HELEN SANDS, DOUGLAS HUBBELL, and TED WENDT, the schedule of performances will include: Excerpts from Tom Sawyer by Mark Twain, "The UFO Menace" by Woody Allen, "The Pedestrian" by Ray Bradbury (directed by DR. SANDS); "Who Am I This Time?" by Kurt Vonnegut (directed by DR. WENDT) and "What Is It, Mrs. Perkins?" by Art Buchwald (directed by DR. HUBBELL).

Though it involves a skillful cutting and reshaping of material, a variety of staging techniques must also be employed for the successful transformation of a work of fiction to dramatic form. Some of these techniques will include sound effects and special theatrical lighting, and also a unique use of the imagination as performers invite audience members to envision scenes distinct as those of a Mississippi river bank and that of modern city.

All performers are Communications or Theatre students, many from DR. SAND's Advanced Oral Interpretation class. Normally seen snatching rebounds and stuffing baskets, Big John Hollinden -- the 7'1" starting center for the ISUE Screaming Eagles basketball team -- will play Huck Finn in the excerpt from Tom Sawyer.

The performances will begin at 8:00 p.m. each evening at the ISUE Playhouse on Igleheart Avenue. Tickets are \$1.00 and are available at the Playhouse or in the Pyramid Lounge during Spring Week.

**HUMANITIES FORUM.** Modern fictions and their experimental counterparts will be examined in Professor Joseph Weixlmann's Humanities Forum on Friday, April 18.

Weixlmann, who teaches with the English Department at Indiana State University, will present "An Introduction to Modern Experimental Fiction" and discuss contemporary movements in fiction and non-traditional writing.

According to Weixlmann, some of the current experimental movements -- such as the Metafiction movement -- have already spurred important reactions, and he will consider some of these.

Weixlmann most recently spoke before a meeting of the Modern Language Association where he dealt with current trends in fiction and also black fiction.

His forum is from 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m. in Room UC 350.
