USI THEATRE TO PRESENT CLASSICS. Dr. James R. Blevins, chairman of the Division of Humanities, and Dr. Douglas Hubbell, USI Theatre director and assistant professor of communications, report the USI Theatre has scheduled an ambitious 1987-88 season offering three American classics as a historical observance in conjunction with the bicentennials of the U. S. Constitution and the Northwest Ordinance. The plays to be presented are Mr. Arthur Miller's "All My Sons," Mr. Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie," and Mr. Maxwell Anderson's "Joan of Lorraine." Dr. Blevins will be the director for "All My Sons," with Mr. James Foland, new manager/director of New Harmony Theatre, to undertake the leading role. The play was Mr. Miller's first hit, immediately preceding "Death of a Salesman," and opened on Broadway in 1947. A contemporary revival is on Broadway now, with Mr. Richard Kiely in the lead. USI Theatre will present "All My Sons" on October 15-16-17 and 22-23-24.

"The Glass Menagerie" will be presented November 26-27-28 and December 3-4-5, with a guest director who still must be selected. This play opened on Broadway in 1945 and was Mr. Williams' first major success as a playwright. "Joan of Lorraine" is a play within a play in which the cast members are rehearsing "Joan of Lorraine" and will perform both their contemporary roles and the roles in the play. This also will have a guest director, still to be chosen. "Joan" opened in Washington, D. C., in 1946 with Ms. Ingrid Bergman in the starring role. USI Theatre will present it on March 3-4-5 and 10-11-12.

LITERACY TELECONFERENCE SLATED. A nationwide teleconference on "Literacy, Your Community and Its Workforce" will be presented at 6 p.m. Tuesday, June 23, in the USI Conference Center, with the local program sponsored by the Evansville Coalition for Adult Literacy, Ivy Tech-Southwest, the Private Industry Council, and USI. The American Association of Community and Junior Colleges is presenting the national teleconference. It will feature Mrs. Barbara Bush, Mr. Andrew Young, Governor Martha Lane Collins, and U.S. Department of Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldridge, among others; newsman Hugh Downs will moderate the program. All interested persons are invited to join community leaders and professionals in attending this 3 1/2-hour program covering such topics as "The Urgency of the Illiteracy Problem for Our Country's Workforce," "How Are Communities Responding to the Problem: Solutions Under Way," and "Where Can Communities Turn for Help?" ELDERHOSTEL 1987 STARTS JUNE 21. Around 30 senior citizens will come from Oregon, Texas, and the Midwest to Elderhostel 1987, which will be held June 21-27 on the USI campus. Participants will arrive Sunday, June 21, for registration and the opening dinner, when they will meet the program staff and instructors for the three courses being offered this year. RAMESSES TOUR HAS OPENINGS. Openings still are available for the July weekend trip to Memphis, Tennessee, to see the Ramesses exhibition of more than 70 priceless artifacts on loan from the Egyptian Museum in Cairo. Ramesses the Great ruled Egypt during the period when Memphis on the Nile was Egypt's capital. Now, more than 3,000 years later, the Ramesses exhibit comes to Memphis on the Mississippi. It features gold jewelry, funerary pieces, dishware and vessels, statues, and the world's first known clock. In size and scope, the exhibit is considered more important than the King Tut exhibit. Dr. Daniel Scavone, USI professor of history, will accompany the tour group to provide expert commentary on the background and history of the exhibit. The trip is being sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education and also includes a visit to Mud Island, a combination of park and museum dedicated to the culture and history of the Mississippi River.
