RALPH NADER ON CAMPUS TUESDAY, APRIL 16. Consumer advocate Ralph Nader will appear at ISSUE on April 16 at 8:00 p.m. in the new Health, Physical Education and Recreation building.

The crusading attorney first made headlines in 1965 with his book Unsafe at Any Speed in which he accused the auto industry of producing unsafe vehicles. He has been responsible for at least six major federal consumer protection laws and for the recall of millions of defective motor vehicles. He has built an effective national network of citizen action groups that have a major impact in areas ranging from tax reform to nuclear energy. The ultimate goal of this movement is to give all citizens more rights and remedies for resolving their grievances and achieving a better society.

Nader's concerns currently include corporate power in America, pollution, energy monopolies and energy consumers, professional responsibilities of the professions, the uses of education, and the citizen's movement in America.
