## UNIVERSITY BUDGET DELAYED

University President Dr. David L. Rice reports the Indiana General Assembly adjourned without agreeing on the state budget. The Governor plans to call a special session of the legislature to complete the budgeting process, when he feels both houses are in agreement on the issues.

There are varying estimates of when that might be and also of what form the budget may take, Dr. Rice noted. The University is not able to undertake its budgeting until the legislature acts on the state budget, of which USI's appropriation is a part.

Dr. Rice said, "As soon as the state budget is approved, we will complete our budget here, allowing us to issue salary letters." He thanked all employees for their patience.

### STUDENTS CONTRIBUTE TO SCHOOLHOUSE FUND

West Terrace School students collected pennies in support of the Westwood Garden Club project to move the old Bockelman School to the USI campus and visited May 21 with USI President David L. Rice to present their check for \$750.

The old one-room schoolhouse, also known as Perry Township School No. 3, was used from 1896 to 1939. It stands on Middle Mt. Vernon Road, in the right-of-way for the proposed overpass entrance to the USI campus. It will be relocated to a site near Eicher Barn, in the Bent Twig Outdoor Education area, and restored. The move is expected June 15.

The Westwood Garden Club will continue fund-raising efforts as needed to complete the move and restoration. Other elementary schools that helped raise money for the club project include Cynthia Heights, Daniel Wertz, and Tekoppel.

## YOUNG ABE LINCOLN, BIG RIVER

The outdoor musical *Young Abe Lincoln* will begin its seventh season on Friday, June 11, at the Lincoln Amphitheatre in Lincoln City, Indiana. *Big River*, a musical rendition of Mark Twain's classic Huck Finn tales, will open its second season at the amphitheatre on Friday, July 2. The shows begin at 8 p.m. daily except Mondays, when the amphitheatre is closed, and will be presented on alternate nights through August 21. The schedule allows each to be featured every other weekend.

The \$3-million Lincoln Amphitheatre was built by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources to showcase the story of former President Lincoln's life in southern Indiana from age 7 to 21. Mr. Billy Edd Wheeler, a playwright, songwriter, humorist, and performer, combined the best of many talents in creating the musical. The Tony Award-
