The New Harmony Theatre announces its 1999 season

The New Harmony Theatre 1999 season will open with the Cole Porter musical *You Never Know*, followed by Anton Chekhov's *The Cherry Orchard*, and close with *Steel Magnolias*.

Although originally produced on Broadway in 1938, Cole Porter's *You Never Know* is being treated as a new musical by The New Harmony Theatre. Conceived by Porter and writer Rowland Leigh as a small cast, one-set musical, Porter suffered a serious riding accident which removed him from the production process. The producers rewrote some of the parts and introduced songs by other composers.

In the early 1980s, Director Paul Lazarus readapted the musical to its original form and produced it successfully at four regional theatres. The New Harmony Theatre has received special permission from the Porter estate to produce the show. This is only the fifth time the show will be performed the way Porter intended. *You Never Know* will open Friday, June 11, and continue through Sunday, June 27.

Academy Award-winning actress Olympia Dukakis will direct Chekhov's early twentieth century masterpiece *The Cherry Orchard* which opens Friday, July 9, and continues through Sunday, July 25. Dukakis won the Oscar for Best Supporting Actress in the 1988 movie *Moonstruck*. Dukakis' husband, Louis Zorich, currently portraying Burt Buchman on NBC's *Mad About You*; her brother Apollo, who appeared in *Death of a Salesman* at NHT last season; and her daughter Christina will be featured in the cast.

Steel Magnolias by Robert Harling runs from Friday, July 30, to Sunday, August 15. Made into a popular movie, this critically-acclaimed play centers around a group of sassy southern ladies frequenting a beauty salon in Louisiana. "The play is very funny and touching, and in the end, it becomes a profound statement of the human condition. The show certainly has something for everyone," said director Scott LaFeber.

Curtain times at The New Harmony Theatre are 7:30 p.m. on Thursdays, 8 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, and 2 p.m. on Sundays. Season tickets are available at \$40 for adults and \$36 for seniors (60+) and students. Visa, MasterCard and Discover are accepted. For more information, or to charge by phone, call 682-3115.

Hunter is majoring in business administration and was a volunteer second grade tutor at Caze Elementary School last year.



USI receives bid to NCAA II Women's Soccer Tournament

The USI women's soccer team, ranked seventh nationally, will make their first appearance in the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer Tournament, playing at the University of Southern Illinois-Edwardsville at 1 p.m. on Saturday, November 14.

The Screaming Eagles had a 17-2-1 overall record, 9-1-0 Great Lakes Valley Conference, and finished second in the league. USI also placed second in the conference tournament held Saturday - Sunday, November 7 - 8, losing to Northern Kentucky University in the finals at SIUE.

The squad is led by junior midfielder Megan Russell (Evansville, Indiana), who has 38 points on 12 goals and 14 assists. She is followed closely by sophomore forward Stephanie Minor (Evansville, Indiana), who has 27 points on 11 goals and five assists.

The 12 goals by Russell set a school record, breaking the single season mark of ten set by Minor last year as a freshman.

USI has the GLVC's top goalkeeper in junior Angie Gries (Evansville, Indiana) between the posts. In 20 games this year, Gries has a 0.57 GAA and nine shutouts in 1,577 minutes in goal for USI.

Under the direction of Head Coach Greg Stone, women's soccer is in its third year as a varsity sport at the University and is 37-17-2 (.679) overall.

Women's Cross Country team off to nationals, Kapsoiya advances for men

USI's women's cross country team qualified for the NCAA Division II National Finals on Saturday, November 7, when they placed second in the Great Lakes Regional at Hillsdale College. They were led by junior Nicole Shepler (Fishers, Indiana), who finished ninth overall with a time of 22:55.5 in the 6K course. Senior Christy Moore (Nashville, Indiana) placed 20th, sophomore Melissa Eddy (Hope, Indiana) finished 23rd, and sophomore Jesicca Vagedes (Gosport, Indiana) finished 30th in the 25-team field. The national finals are hosted by Emporia State College, and will take place on Saturday, November 21, in Lawrence, Kansas.

This is the second straight year the women have advanced to the nationals. Last season they finished twelfth at the nationals.
