NEW WRITING EMPHASIS AT ISUE. The English Department at ISUE has announced new curricular changes intended to increase the emphasis on writing. The new plan offers instruction in the professional aspects of writing both for students majoring in English and for others whose professional goals make highly developed writing skills an attractive option.

Planning for the new program followed an extensive survey of area businesses and industries who agreed that more preparation in writing could be useful to employees seeking advancement. "In fact," said Dr. Thomas Wilhelmus, who heads the ISUE English Department, "the myth that we're moving into an electronic age that will diminish the importance of written communication is wrong. Someone has to write the material, even to instruct the computer programmer. Business and the professions are finding they produce more writing, not less, in the current atmosphere."

In the new program, students will have a number of options to choose a major, minor, or a special concentration to meet their needs. An English major will be free to choose either a Bachelor of Science or a Bachelor of Arts degree and to choose to emphasize either literature or writing. All students will continue to take both but will have a choice in the number of hours. Similar choices exist for the English minor. Professors believe that the writing emphasis will be especially attractive to students majoring in business or in a discipline where they may be expected to write professionally. A special feature of the modifications, new to ISUE and to the State of Indiana, is "The Writing Concentration," a certificate program of five courses (15 semester hours) for graduates and undergraduates who want intense professional training in writing without seeking a major or minor.
