Mr. Michael J. Lorenger, an attorney in the Washington, D.C., office of Baker and Hostetler, will replace another member of the firm as the Sydney Berger lecturer at 7 p.m. Wednesday, March 19, in Mitchell Auditorium.

Mr. David L. Marburger had to cancel due to a trial conflict and Mr. Lorenger will carry out the plan to discuss legal issues in the communications industry, particularly libel law, and privacy and constitutional issues related to use of the Internet.

The Sydney Berger lecture is sponsored by private funds from the USI Foundation to honor the late Evansville attorney who defended individual civil rights and liberties and was an adjunct professor of constitutional law at USI for nearly 20 years.

Mr. Lorenger, a member of the bar in Washington and Virginia, has assisted in a variety of matters in general litigation and libel defense areas, primarily in state and federal courts in Virginia. He has been with Baker and Hostetler two years.

Mr. Lorenger received a B.A. in journalism and political science in 1991 from the University of Iowa, where he was Phi Beta Kappa, and formerly was editorial page editor and weekly columnist for *The Daily Iowan* in Iowa City. He was a personal financial planner with American Express Financial Services in Richmond, Virginia, before entering the University of Virginia School of Law, where he was active with the *Virginia Law Review* and the *Journal of Law and Politics* and was a weekly columnist for the *The Cavalier Daily*. His publications include "Teaching an Old Dog New Tricks: the First Amendment in an Online World," co-written with Mr. Bruce Sanford and published in the *Connecticut Law Review* (1996), and "Ake v. Oklahoma and Harmless Error: the case for a per se

A Japanese professor and Robert Owen Scholar will speak at USI on Monday, March 17, opening the 1997 Communal Studies Center lecture series. Dr. Yoshio Nagai will discuss "Robert Owen Studies in Japan: 1910-1990" at noon in Forum I. The program is free and open to the University community and the public. Dr. Nagai is a professor at Kanto Gakun University in Yokohama. He has researched, written, and spoken widely on Robert Owen, who led the progressive Owenite community in New Harmony, Indiana, in the 1820s.
