WOMEN'S HISTORY CELEBRATION. On campus, last Friday, Mayor Michael Vandever issued a proclamation for Women's History Week (March 6-12) and the Women's History Celebration which runs March 7 through March 19. Sponsored by Indiana State University Evansville, in cooperation with several women's organizations, the Women's History Celebration is supported by a grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities.

During the two-week celebration, programs of interest to women will be held at various locations in Evansville. Today, Dr. Frances Brown will lecture on "The Feminist Movement: 1848 - 1983" at noon at The Old Courthouse; Dr. Jane Follis will speak on "Southern Indiana's Contribution to Feminism - Fanny Wright" at 4:00 p.m. at the YWCA; and Ms. Janet Wyatt will talk on the "Changing Images of Women" at 6:30 p.m. at the YWCA.


Other topics throughout the week: "Women as Workers: The Evansville Story"; "Women in the Church"; "Herstory: Women in American History"; "Sex Differences and Behavior: Biological & Cultural Differences"; and "From the Shtetl to the Suburbs: The Literary Odyssey of the Jewish Woman in America." On Tuesday, March 15, "La Strada" starring Giulietta Masina will be shown at 2:00 and 6:00 p.m. in Forum One. Dr. Sherry Darrell will lead the discussion following the film. The film and discussion are sponsored by the ISUE Division of Humanities.

LECTURE AND SLIDES. Dr. Michael Rynkiewich, anthropologist, will lecture and present slides on "Cultural Ecology and Colonialism in Micronesia" on Tuesday, March 15 at 12:30 p.m. in Science Center, Room 290. Everyone is invited to attend.

HVAC CONVERSION PROJECT. As a part of the Energy Conservation Measures Grant Project, the Technology Center heating, ventilating, and air-conditioning system will be converted from the existing constant volume to a variable air volume system. This work will include replacing mixing boxes, relocating and installing new thermostats, and re-balancing the system.

Replacing the mixing boxes will require system fans to be shut off during working hours for approximately four days. This may result in slightly uncomfortable space temperatures. Tentative date for the installation to begin is the week of March 21. This project should be substantially completed well before the end of the semester.
