

## Red Spot president to speak at World Trade Council meeting



Charles D. Storms, president and CEO of Red Spot Paint and Varnish Co. Inc., will present "Meeting Global Trends for Automotive Coatings" at the monthly meeting of the Tri-State World Trade Council scheduled for 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Thursday, August 17, in Carter Hall, University Center. Storms, who joined Red Spot in 1966 as manager of the

Lacquer Research Department, was named president in 1973 and assumed the roles of chairman, president, and CEO in 1993.

Storms has written technical papers and articles related to the coating business and speaks at national and international conferences and seminars. He has held leadership positions in the Society of Plastic Engineers, the Society of Manufacturing Engineering, the Association for Finishing Processes, the Society of Vacuum Coaters, and the National Paint and Coating Association. Within the Evansville community, he has been a leader in the United Way, YMCA, Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce, and University of Evansville School of Business.

The company entered the international marketplace in 1959 and by the early 1960s was successfully conducting business with Japanese electronics companies. Red Spot employs 500 people. A quarter of the employees work in research and development and have created processes for applying abrasion-resistant coatings on a variety of auto parts. Red Spot now sells paints and other coatings to auto makers on six continents, competing with industry giants like DuPont Co. and Germany's BASF AG.

## Fiber art exhibition to open at gallery

Ms. Ann Coddington Rast, a teacher at the University of Illinois-Champaign and Parkland College, will exhibit her work at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art from Saturday, August 19, through Saturday, September 30. A free public reception will be held for the artist from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, August 19.

In the exhibition "brown," Ms. Rast employs the technique of twining with waxed linen as the primary focus of her art. Her minimalist forms are constructed with this simple technique, built stitch upon stitch.

Ms. Rast is known for making elegant biomorphic forms possessing strong conceptual links to the human body.

"My artwork borrows the technique of twining from the traditional craft of basketry to create a sculptural expression of my beliefs and experiences and how they are sensed by the body," said Ms. Rast. "I am intrigued by the process of and differences between feeling and knowing."

# Crawford named dean of the School of Liberal Arts



The University community welcomes Dr. Iain Crawford as dean of the School of Liberal Arts. Since 1995, he was chair of the English Department at Bridgewater State College in Bridgewater, Massachusetts. Dr. Crawford was assistant professor of English at Berry College in Mount Berry, Georgia, from 1985 to 1990 when he was named associate professor of

English. At Berry College, he acted as department coordinator, served as president of the Faculty Council, and on the Executive Committee of Academic Council and the Graduate Council.

Dr. Crawford received a B.A. from University of Leeds, West Yorkshire, England, majoring in both English and Greek Civilization and the Ph.D. from University of Leicester, Leicester, England. His dissertation "Victorian Theme and Convention in the Novels of Charles Dickens" is one of his many papers on Dickens' literature.

Dr. Crawford's articles on literature, television, and other cultural and social topics have appeared in *The Dickensian*, *The Mid-Atlantic Almanack*, *Journal of Popular Culture*, and *Dickens Quarterly*, among others. His reviews of scholarly articles have appeared in *South Atlantic Review* and *The Dickensian*.
